RATE OF 25 MILLS

City Council Fix a Figure to Cover all Expenditure.

Civic Representatives are Worried Over the Uncontrollable Payments and do Some Anxious Figuring.

The city bell had not yet tolled ten when Mayor Smith affixed his signature to the civic by-law last evening setting a rate of 25 mills on the dollar as the tax assessment for the ensuing year.
