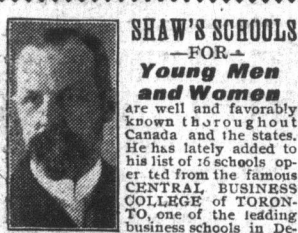

## FARMER PROTECTS CROP

Surveyors Run Off the Clarke Farm Near Bolton.

Trying to Run a Line for the C. P. R. But Were Worsted in the Fight, Which, However, Will Likely Be Resumed Before Brampton Court Authorities at an Early Date—Charges and Counter-Charges Laid.

Bolton, July 29.—The C. P. R. surveyors have gone up against a snag. They attempted to run a line through the Clarke farm just south of the village, but met with opposition. Charles Clarke, the owner, ordered the surveyors off the premises, but the latter did not comply. Charles's brothers, William and Robert, took a hand and the result was a pitched battle in which the surveyors came off second best. Shortly afterwards they returned with reinforcements when much threatening language was used and surveyor's stakes and lines were said to have been exhibited in a hostile manner. The surveyors finally moved off. Charges and counter-charges have been laid by the belligerents with the Brampton authorities, which will no doubt be heard at the court. Clarke says he was simply protecting his crop from injury and was willing that the surveyors should proceed with their work if they would first make arrangements to pay him for the damage which would be done to his growing crop.

## STILL STIR UP TROUBLE.

Rouvier and Von Radelin Unable to Get Together on Terms.

Paris, July 29.—France's relations with Germany are again showing signs of strain owing to the inability of Premier Rouvier and Ambassador Von Radelin to conclude a definite program for the Moroccan conference. The agreement of July 8 contemplated a joint program, but the arrangement of this program is causing renewed difficulty, particularly in connection with the right to police the territory adjoining Algeria and supervise the maintenance of order throughout the Empire. It is the French view that those rights follow from the agreement of July 8. Germany does not wish to define the extent of French police and financial reforms. The indecisive status of the negotiations has caused renewed apprehension on the bourse, and the newspapers have renewed their sharp criticism of Germany's course. It is expected that the Presidential election will be fixed for January 26, 1906, but the Government has not yet definitely announced the date owing to constitutional questions being affected.

## GOD'S REWARD, SAYS SULTAN.

His Preservation From Bomb Due to Divine Protection.

Constantinople, July 29.—In reply to a Mussulman address of loyalty and gratification at his escape from assassination by the explosion of a bomb on Friday last, the Sultan says that the protection of divine Providence on that occasion was God's reward to him for his constant endeavors to promote the peace and happiness of his people. The only feature of the incident which deeply affected him was the fact that so many of his dear, devoted soldiers and well-beloved people were killed or injured.

## ANOTHER ABDUCTION CASE.

Wheatley Man Used Bad Judgment and Is Jailed.

Wheatley, July 29.—On Wednesday afternoon Paul Lague, porter in the Commercial Hotel here, hired a rig, and, with a woman, drove to a house on Miss Fitch's property. The woman, told her mother they were going to Leamington to see a ball game. But, on driving away, instead of going west towards Leamington, they went east in the direction of Tilbury. This aroused suspicion and the police were notified. Constable Wellwood of Tilbury was "phoned a description of them, and a few minutes after their arrival they were taken in to custody and later on brought back to Wheatley.

## SHOT GUN QUARANTINE.

New Orleans, La., July 29.—Although the unofficial reports made public yesterday showed a larger number of yellow fever deaths than Thursday, when there were only two, and the appearance of several new cases, the men of science who are warning against the yellow fever plague believe the situation well in hand. Owing to the increasing number of local quarantines it is almost impossible to go twenty miles without Mississippi without a health certificate. The shot gun quarantine is again in evidence and there is every indication of a revival of the sickly feeling of seven or eight years ago.

## \$500 SAVES BLUEBEARD'S LIFE.

Chicago, July 29.—Alleged pitiless slayer and swindler of unnumbered women, "Bluebeard," Johann Hoch, was yesterday, by a woman's ploy, given a respite of two hours from the hangman, and before the two hours were up had been reprieved for four weeks more. The four weeks were secured, not by pity, but by cold cash. The exact amount of money essential for an appeal of his case to the Supreme Court was \$500. Miss Cora Wilson was the woman.

## George Ham's Many Friends.

Montreal, July 29.—George Ham of the C. P. R. was yesterday morning declared by his physician to be practically out of danger. Since his illness his office staff has been able to do little but answer letters and telegrams from all over the continent as to his condition. Mr. Ham's room at the Western Hospital is simply a bower of flowers sent by friends from far and near.

## Winnipeg Fair a Success.

Winnipeg, July 29.—The fair closed yesterday. The total attendance for the week is about 110,000 or 40,000 short of the aggregate for the Dominion Fair, which ran a full fortnight. In no other year have the total paid admissions passed the 100,000 mark.

## Young Man Disappears.

Prussels, July 29.—Early Wednesday morning John J. Strachan, son of Thomas Strachan, ex reeve of Grey, left his home and has not been heard of since. Searching parties are out scouring the entire neighborhood.

## A CIVILIZED MONARCH

King Edward Will Create Mikado as a Garter Knight.

Demonstration That the Court of St. James and England Believe Japan's Ruler to Be in the First Class—Prince of Wales Will Make State Visit to Tokio to Make the Invention.

London, July 29.—The Emperor of Japan is about to be created a Knight of the Garter. The investiture will take place at Tokio during the coming winter. In view of the fact that the Kaiser conferred the order of the Black Eagle upon Prince Arisugawa, and of the possibility of the emperor in Manchuria being indefinitely prolonged, it has been determined to furnish to the Japanese a demonstration that the Court of St. James and the English people regard the ruler of Japan as forming one of the brotherhood of civilized monarchs. It is understood the Prince and Princess of Wales, on the completion of their State progress through India in the late autumn, will proceed to Tokio for the purpose of paying a State visit to the Court of Japan, and that the British heir apparent will then undertake the ceremony of investing the Mikado with the Order of the Garter in the name of King Edward.

## China Wants \$100,000,000.

New York, July 29.—The Washington correspondent of The Tribune says: Coincident with China's notice to the Powers that Manchuria must be rescued from her, whatever may be the terms of agreement reached at the Portsmouth peace conference by the envoys of Russia and Japan, it is learned that the Chinese Government intends to follow this up by demanding of the belligerents a big indemnity as compensation for the occupation of Manchuria by hostile armies. The amount of the indemnity to be asked will be at least \$100,000,000. It is not believed that the Chinese themselves seriously expect reimbursement for the injury sustained, but the motive is further to define her position with regard to Manchuria to the world at large.

## Japs Don't Want Armistice.

New York, July 29.—It was learned yesterday that the Japanese peace envoys do not want an armistice and will probably oppose any move for one made by the Russian Committee unless they are permitted to dictate terms and fix the time limit. Japanese plenipotentiaries feel that an armistice would militate against the success of Roosevelt's peace plans, and under the terms of the Russian Government would be less anxious to reach a settlement.

## German Steamer Seized.

Tokyo, July 29.—The German steamer Lydia, 1,000 tons, has been seized by the Japanese near Looschoo.

## BALFOUR AND EMPIRE LEAGUE.

Premier Promises to Consider the Recent Resolutions.

London, July 29.—Mr. Balfour has written the secretary of the British Empire League, promising that their resolutions passed at the meeting on the 3rd inst. will receive the careful attention of the Government.

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## Appointed to R. M. C.

London, July 29.—(C. A. F.)—Capt. De Bury of the Royal Garrison Artillery, garrison adjutant at the Windward Isles, has been appointed professor of artillery in the Royal Military College of Canada.

## Cheese Factory Burns.

Cornwall, July 29.—May's cheese factory at Martintown, one of the largest in Glenagarry, has been destroyed by fire along with the entire plant and 124 boxes of cheese.

## Miss Marjorie Grandbois' Little Daughter.

Miss Marjorie Grandbois, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Grandbois, Adelaide street, entertained a number of her young friends at Victoria Park yesterday, it being her fourth birthday.

## ALL SUPPORTED CABLE.

Delegates Finish Conference—Agree to Overcome Obstacles.

London, July 29.—The Pacific cable conference held its last sitting yesterday, when the report of the committee was agreed upon. The Canadian Associated Press understands the results of the conference will be cabled to the Governments of Canada, New Zealand, Australia, but at present the proceedings will not be made public. All the delegates gave unanimous support to the Pacific cable and agreed to get rid of the obstacles at present in the way. Though the difficulty with the Eastern Telegraph Company cannot be altogether removed, it is thought the agreement between Australia and the company will be modified considerably in favor of the Pacific cable, the Australian Government following the advice of the delegates from Canada, Great Britain and New Zealand and will be content to work the cable at a loss for a time. It is being provided that a definite term be fixed to the privileged position of the Eastern Company.

## DIVIDING NORTHWEST ASSETS.

Government Will Appoint Liquidator at Early Date.

Ottawa, July 29.—Under a provision of the Autonomy bills the Government will shortly appoint a liquidator to make a division between the two new Provinces of the assets of the Northwest Territorial Government. These consist of not only the federal grants for Government and Public Works, which shall have been expended on Sept. 1, but also of a considerable sum representing receipts from licenses and other territorial franchises, as well as the equipment of the Government buildings at Regina. It is likely that the liquidator will be some official of the Northwest having an intimate knowledge of the territorial finances.

## JOHN A. RITCHIE SHOT.

Found in Rosedale With a Bullet in His Head.

Toronto, July 29.—John A. Ritchie of 18 Park road, a bookkeeper in the Menzies Wall Paper Co., King street, shot himself early today. He was found lying under the trees at the corner of Bismarck street and Park road with a bullet wound in his temple and dying. A police ambulance conveyed him to the General Hospital, where he passed away shortly after 1 o'clock.

## THE SCRIP ENQUIRY.

Witnesses Claim to Have Sold Under Pressure of Threats.

Killarney, Man., July 29.—The scrip inquiry continued yesterday before Judge Myers. A number of witnesses were examined, and the evidence was similar to that already adduced. The witnesses claimed to have sold to McDonald under pressure of threat or misrepresentation and without actual knowledge of the purport of the paper signed.

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
