**The C. P. R. Through Train at
Winnipeg.**
WINNIPEG, Man., July 1.—The first
through train from ocean to ocean arrived
here on time at 9 10 this morning. It had
a brilliant reception by the citizens, who
turned out in immense numbers. An
address was presented to General Separin,
its important share in the completion of
the great project. The train was received
at the depot by the 90th Battalion, Field
Battery, Cavalry, and Military School,
who together made an imposing spectacle.
A salute by the Battery and a few de jols
were fired as the train moved in.
