#### FARRINGTON'S POSITION.

According to the announcements  
 that have been published concerning  
 today's demonstration Frank Far-  
 rington will be one of the principal  
 speakers. According to a recent  
 issue of the "Union Record" he has  
 been speaking in Seattle. Now he is  
 understood that the "Record" is one  
 of these publications whose reports  
 are always true and always right. It  
 therefore follows that when it reports  
 Mr. Farrington it reports him cor-  
 rectly. Thus when it says that Far-  
 rington in, in reference to the  
 strike on the Island, that everything  
 was going finely, that there had  
 been no defections of any consequence  
 among the men, and that the pros-  
 pects of winning the strike had never  
 been brighter than at present, it  
 has to be accepted that the Record  
 is saying just what Farrington him-  
 self said. Perhaps in his speech, to-  
 day, Farrington will explain how he  
 arrived at these conclusions. We ad-  
 mit that it is the first duty of a  
 leader to encourage his followers,  
 and that he must cultivate an air of  
 buoyant enthusiasm. That is no rea-  
 son why the leader should allow his  
 enthusiasm, either real or affected,  
 to carry him clear away from truth  
 and plausibility. Mr. Farrington was  
 talking sheer guff at Seattle. No-  
 body knows it better, and realizes it  
 more bitterly than Mr. Farrington.

He may talk as he likes at Se-  
 attle. There was no one there to con-  
 tradict him, and he just had to pand-  
 er to and nourish the carefully devel-  
 oped legend that failure has no mean-  
 ing to him and the organization with  
 which he is identified. It is rather  
 different in Nanaimo, and he must  
 face the facts of the situation he  
 is in. He is far from the  
 prospects of winning the strike nev-  
 er having been brighter, the strike is  
 absolutely all over. The only thing  
 that is preventing the mines on the  
 Island from getting back to the pro-  
 duction of 1911 is the slack state of  
 the coal market. The United Mine  
 Workers of America has nothing to  
 do with the situation, does not af-  
 fect it in any way. The mines are  
 producing more coal than can be in-  
 marketed. Their output could be in-

creased if the demand quickened, but  
 at present it is more liable to be  
 decreased. Indeed, the Jingle Pot has  
 already reduced its force by half.  
 Farrington and his lieutenants may  
 misrepresent the situation outside  
 and make a fine big noise at home  
 but they have no standing, and their  
 organization has no standing in the  
 island coal industry. This is doubtless  
 a very unpalatable fact, but it re-  
 mains a fact all the same. It is the  
 direct outcome of the game of freeze  
 out to which the members of the  
 United Mine Workers were committed  
 last October or November. The mines  
 are being operated entirely independ-  
 ently of the Mine Workers organiza-  
 tion, its local bosses, and the men  
 they persuaded to follow them.

This is the situation today, and  
 this is the situation for which Far-  
 rington claims to be wholly respon-  
 sible. He has on many occasions, on  
 the platform, in the public press, and  
 in a letter to the Minister of Jus-  
 tice boasted that he alone was  
 responsible for calling the strike,  
 and that he personally had directed

every movement since it started. It  
 follows logically that he is responsi-  
 ble for the situation confronting the  
 men out of work today. It is the  
 right and the privilege of these men  
 to demand a full accounting from  
 this great labor dictator. He stripped  
 them of every common right and  
 privilege of manhood in the begin-  
 ning, even to their franchise which  
 forms the basic principle of every  
 democratic institution. Even if it is  
 charitably assumed that his despotism  
 was meant to be benevolent, the  
 responsibility for the effects now be-  
 coming fixed upon him alone. He has  
 vocally fixed upon him alone. He has  
 to answer to the men for the sorry  
 and helpless plight in which he has  
 bogged them. Why he should have  
 entered into their affairs as dictator  
 he has never yet satisfactorily ex-  
 plained. He has spun fairy stories  
 without end, and indicated much real-  
 ly beautiful prose fiction. He has us-  
 ed his superior education and his  
 training in labor intrigue to dupe  
 and deceive them, and plainly lied to  
 them as in the case of the alleged  
 application to the Labor Department  
 for a board of investigation. Sleek  
 and secure in his high-salaried office,  
 he has boasted of the sound thrash-  
 ing they were giving the operators,  
 cruelly unmindful of the suffering and  
 hardship he was causing the men.

Have the men ever thought that they  
 were doing the fighting while Far-  
 rington was doing the boasting? What  
 kind of a leader is he who cheers his  
 men on from behind, and at a safe  
 distance from the firing line? And when  
 there was trouble the men "were fools,"  
 and did not know enough to keep their  
 mouths shut. The mistake the men made  
 was in ever submitting to Farrington's  
 dictatorship. The unfortunate part of it  
 is that it is not Farrington but the men  
 who are paying, and will pay for it.  
 It is even doubtful if they will get  
 an accounting from Farrington, and  
 almost a certainty, in spite of all  
 the announcements, that he will not  
 face the situation today.

We have a resolution from the Vic-  
 toria Local of the Social Democratic  
 party of Canada protesting against  
 the dispatch of militiamen to Nana-  
 imo on May 1 by the Attorney-Gen-  
 eral's Department. If the Social  
 Democrats would take the trouble  
 to ascertain the facts, they would  
 discover that the Attorney-General's  
 Department has no more to do with  
 the dispatch of militiamen to Nana-  
 imo than they have. They also

desire to "protest against the pre-  
 venting of Nanaimo citizens from ex-  
 ercising their right to conduct a peace-  
 able parade on labor's international  
 holiday," and also to express their  
 "disapproval of Mayor Planta's ac-  
 tion in this connection." We do not  
 know if the Social Democrats think  
 the Attorney-General's Department  
 had anything to do with the preven-  
 tion of any parade. If it had, we  
 think all reasonable people will ap-  
 prove its actions. But we do not  
 think it had. We think the respon-  
 sibility for whatever may have been  
 done in this regard rests upon the  
 City Council of Nanaimo, the mem-  
 bers of which body are better able  
 to judge what the welfare of that  
 community demands at the present  
 time than anybody in Victoria—Col-  
 onist.

The provincial police are pursuing  
 an active hunt for the pirates who  
 robbed the launches at Cowichan Bay  
 some days ago. A launch answering  
 the description of the one occupied  
 by the suspicious characters who  
 were seen about Cowichan Bay dur-  
 ing the week of the robberies has  
 been reported as being seen in the  
 neighborhood of Welcome Pass.
