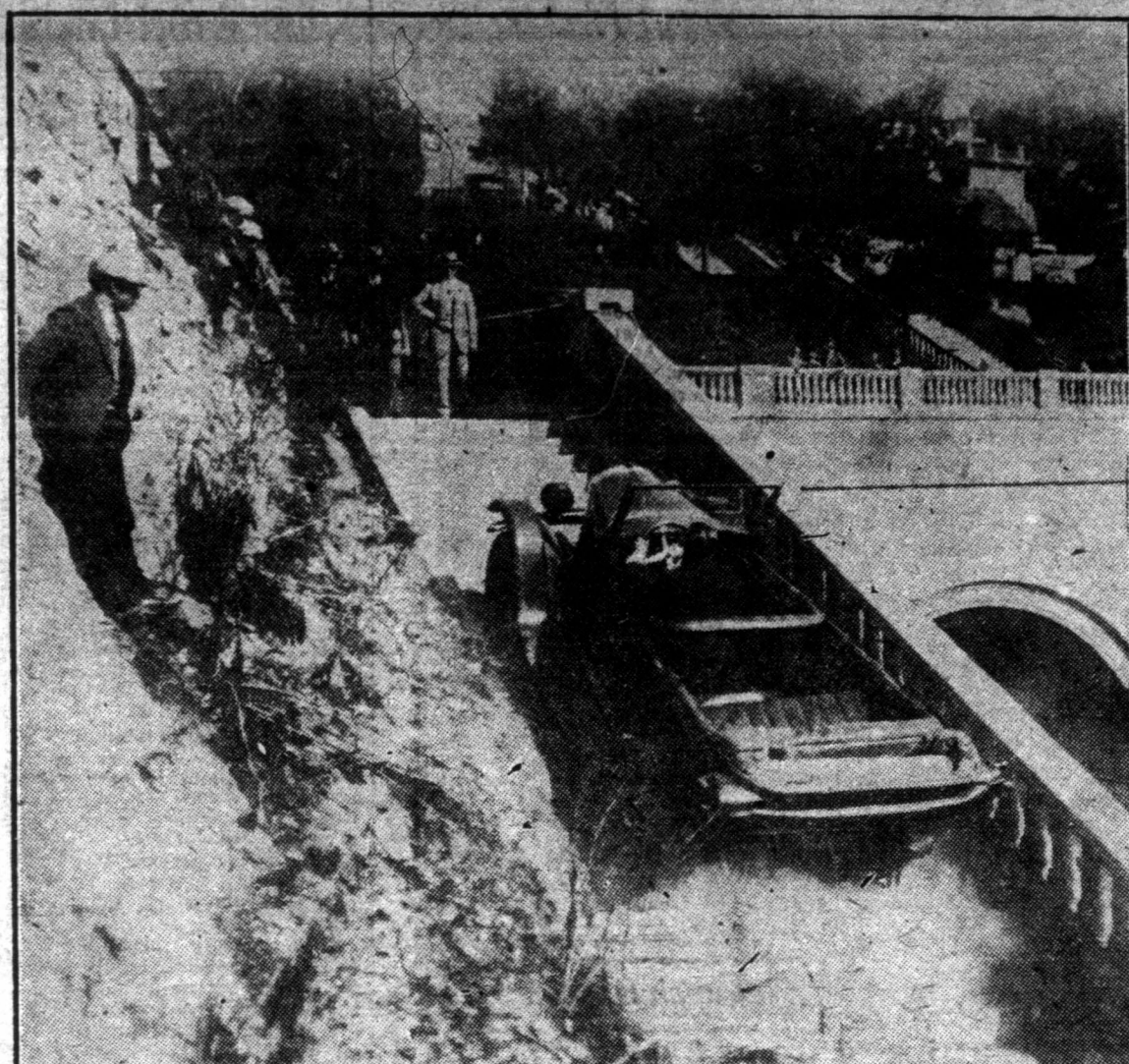

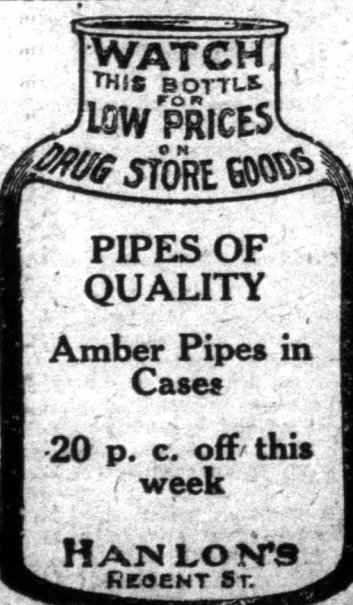

\$11,000,000 FOR U. S. PROHIBITION

Appropriation for Enforcement Passed by House of Representatives.

Washington, Dec. 30.—Provision in the treasury-post office appropriations bill for expenditures of \$11,000,000 for prohibition enforcement during the coming fiscal year was approved by the House.

No effort was made to alter the amount, which is \$341,770 less than the amount available this year, but \$783,120 more than budget estimates.

The House also approved without amendment an allotment of \$200,500, \$25 for coast guard activities, a part of which would be available for current run running. This amount is \$1,763,756 more than the total appropriated for this year.

Rapid progress was made with consideration of the bill which is the largest peace-time supply measure ever before Congress, carrying nearly three-quarters of a billion dollars. Taken up under an agreement limiting debate to three hours, general discussion was completed after little more than half of the text had been read.

Other provisions in the appropriation bill approved to-day by the House were those allotting \$16,656,200 for the customs service, \$7,271,530 for the bureau of engraving and printing, and \$9,103,101 for public health service.

FREE TRANSPORTATION OF POTATOES DENIED

Washington, Dec. 31.—A recent request of Maine potato growers for free transportation in Shipping Board vessels of 10,000,000 bushels of potatoes from Maine to Irish ports has been declined by the Fleet Corporation. The potato growers were told, however, that they could be given the best rates possible at the time the potatoes were to be shipped and were referred to the Boston and New York office of the board for negotiation of rates.

N. S. MINERS REFUSE NEW WAGE SCALE

Sydney, N. S., Dec. 31.—The United Mine Workers' executive having flatly refused to accept the ten per cent. cut in wages proposed by the coal company, the company will immediately apply for a Federal Board of Conciliation, so it was announced early this afternoon at the company's headquarters following the deadlock, which has reached this morning at the miners' wage conference which has been in session this week. Despite the deadlock the conference was not broken off but has adjourned until January 8.

The coal company has proposed a ten per cent. reduction in the miners' wages, with a contract expiring November 30, 1925. This proved unacceptable to the miners, who proposed to negotiate on the basis of the present wage scale.
