At the request of the cities of Toronto and Hamilton, the St. Catharines & Toronto Railway bill, which asks an extension of time for the completion of the road, stood over until Tuesday next, when some of the western railway bills were being discussed.

Hon. Mr. Graham had not the question as to whether the bill should be given a change in the policy generally followed of giving railway companies mining rights and authority to exploit timber limits, erect saw mills, etc.

The Railway Committee to-day reported the Vancouver Island & Eastern Railway Company, to build a road from Victoria by Seymour Narrows through Yel-lowhead Pass near Edmonton.

ASK FOR A GRANT

Towards Monument at Stoney Creek For British Soldiers.

Toronto, Feb. 25.—A deputation waited upon Hon. Messrs. Matheson and Hendrie this morning, and asked that a Provincial grant of \$1,000 be given towards the construction of a park and the erection of a monument at Stoney Creek.

"There are no doubts that it is a very patriotic thing you have done in acquiring this graveyard," asserted Hon. Mr. Matheson. He alluded to the fact that the Wentworth Ladies' Society, too, had purchased land, and were contemplating the erection of a monument, for which Sir Frederick Borden had promised a grant from the Federal Parliament.

The deputation seemed somewhat dubious, and the treasurer said the request would have to be considered. The deputation was introduced by Hon. Col. Hendrie and accompanied by Mr. D. Reed, M. P. P. It included Messrs. President John Gardiner, of the Veterans' Association; F. J. Thomas, of the Army and Navy Association, of Hamilton; President J. A. Green, of the Wentworth Historical Association; Rev. F. E. Hewitt, chaplain of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association; Mr. John Green, grandson of "Billy Green the scout," who warned the Canadians of the approach of the United States troops.

ALL THE SAME.

Nova Scotia York Loan Depositors Lose Contention.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 25.—(Special)—The claim of the York Loan shareholders outside of the Province to rank as creditors on the ground that the issue of their shares, or the collection of calls thereon was ultra vires of the company or in breach of the statute laws of any province, was dismissed, and the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons outside the Province of Ontario are in the same position as the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons within the province.

After reviewing the arguments advanced by counsel on behalf of the Nova Scotia shareholders, Mr. Geo. Kappeler, official referee, thus concluded his judgment, on the question of the position of extra provincial shareholders of the York County Loan & Savings Company.

JUDGMENT GIVEN

For Mr. Cummings in Action Against Dundas.

Mr. M. J. O'Reilly has obtained judgment in the action of Cummings vs. town of Dundas, which was started over four years ago. The plaintiff asked the town to repair the street, and it refused. He then took the matter to court, and before Justice Street, in 1905, the action was dismissed. The plaintiff appealed in the Divisional Court, and the Court upset Justice Street's ruling. The town then appealed to the Court of Appeal, but it refused to allow the matter to be carried any further, and held that the plaintiff was entitled to damages, and ordered the town to pay the costs of the action to the plaintiff, which have amounted to \$625, and the costs of the reference, in the neighborhood of \$200. The defendant's costs are equally as much as the plaintiff's, and the action will cost when it is through about \$2,000. The plaintiff's property is worth about \$800. Mr. H. C. Gwyn, K. C., acted for the town of Dundas.

Smallpox Patient Whose Life Was Despaired of.

Dr. Orr, who is in charge of the smallpox isolation hospital, was able to release Mr. Webb, of 35 Catharine street, this afternoon. Webb was the one patient during the present outbreak whose case was not bad. He had the disease in confluent form, and it was feared that he would die. But he has entirely recovered. With his dismissal all two patients remain in quarantine. There have been no new cases recently, and the Health Department hopes to have completely freed the city of the disease in a short time.

ANCASTER CASE.

Local Option Appeal at Toronto Next Week.

Mr. J. R. Staunton announced to-day that the proceedings to upset the local option by-law in Ancaster will not come up this week, owing to the fact that the temperance party have not yet secured their counsel. The point on which the hotelmen will fight to quash the by-law, is that 90 people voted in the election who were not qualified to do so. The case will be fought out before a single judge.
