TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Latin America's Million Francs for the Faith.

In 1895, Archbishop Soler of Montevideo wrote to the directors of the Work for the Propagation of the Faith, suggesting to them to send delegates through the diocese of South America to make known and organize the work there, and assuring them that thereby South America's previous yearly contributions of \$300,000 francs would rise to a million.

Thither accordingly came, towards the end of 1898, Monsignor Terrien and another priest, both of the Lyons "Society of African Missions." Archbishop Soler issued a pastoral in favour of their object, and advised them to divide and go simultaneously through the several republics of Latin America, visiting in order the principal towns. In the Annals for March, 1898, Monsignor Terrien tells of his plan of work and its success. "There were four classes of subscribers to be established: (1) single, isolated associates not entered on a list, and contributing five cents a month; (2) associates grouped in bands of ten; (3) personal bands, i. e., persons agreeing to be good for the yearly amount of the subscriptions of ten ordinary associates, \$9.00; (4) life members, persons giving once for all \$40 or over.

"To obtain any suitable result (the very small annual tax being only compensated for by the number of associates) I had to use an immense energy. In fact, here in America, as almost everywhere at the present time, the faithful coming spontaneously to give their alms are rare, especially when the work seems a far-off, foreign one. Notwithstanding our many sermons in each church we obtained only few reluctant members; I had to visit the chief families at home, and only by this not very agreeable work was the result obtained. You can easily imagine that many promises were unfulfilled, and that we met annoyances of all kinds. How much discomagement and sadness we often suffered after such visits, which we made sometimes in the rain and cold, sometimes under a burning sun. But the next morning the thought of our missionaries and of the souls to be saved only by such sacrifices made us forget the miseries of the previous day. I must say, however, that I was received everywhere with kindly welcome, and all, with few exceptions, begged me with the most edifying willingness to put down their names.


"But these memberships must be kept up. Inconstancy, alas, is a weakness inherent in human nature, and here it reigns in a great degree. South Americans are very generous, and will give a large charity once, but they do not like to be bound to give every year even an insignificant amount. Therefore I formed in each parish a committee of seven to ten ladies, under the direction of the pastor, and I pointed out to them three principal things to be done. First, a meeting every two months, coincident, if possible, with the arrival of the Annals, for a contribution is more willingly given after such an edifying reading; second, a solemn celebration of the two patron saint days; third, a report on the work in each parish to be sent to the diocesan committee every year. As a final measure I desired there should be a diocesan committee of clergymen and distinguished laymen, to superintend the progress of the association in the various centres, and send each year to the Central Council at Lyons a detailed report and the amount of all the alms collected.

Appealing to the people at all the Masses, speaking as often as seven and nine times in a day, in the different churches, Sunday after Sunday, and visiting in the intervening week-days, Monsignor Terrien succeeded in getting, in every parish, forty, one hundred, or even more, bands of ten. One humble Christian brought \$50 to become a life member and promised further to be every year he lived a personal band, \$60.00 a year. The frequenters of one community church formed a "centre," all to themselves, and the Sodality of the Children of Mary another, of about fifty bands. In short, where the state of Uruguay had the year before contributed only \$214; there were more than 500 bands and seventy life-members, yielding in four months \$6,000.

Next the delegates visited the Argentine Republic, where Archbishop Castellano of Buenos Ayres also cordially recommended their business in a pastoral. We worked on the same lines as in Uruguay for six months. "The native families of the country," says Monsignor Terrien, "have been about

of a negro whose claim to such notoriety was this: that (according to the paper) he was the only colored member of a white congregation in that city. A certain Methodist church was named as having this colored man among its members. Obtrusively, however, proves that in the congregations of several Catholic churches in St. Louis there are negroes, and says that its statement may be easily verified to the satisfaction of both the writer of the fiction and the subject thereof. "If either of them," says our esteemed contemporary, "will attend the Masses at St. Alphonsus, St. Xavier's, the new cathedral, or St. Ann's Catholic Churches on Sunday in the year, they will find the proof. In fact, a great many of the Catholic congregations in this city also have colored members. But we only name the above ones because we have positive knowledge that they substantiate our statement."

If we would but pierce the veil, if we were only watchful and attentive, God would constantly reveal Himself to us, and we would rejoice in all that happens to us; we would perceive that under all events we receive a gift from God; we would understand without difficulty that we want for nothing. If we only lived uninterruptedly the life of faith, we would live in constant intercourse with God; we would speak with Him month to month.—Pere de Caussade.

Interesting Happenings The World Over.

A correspondent of the well-known Italian newspaper, "the Stamp," has written the last few days had an interview with Dr. Lapponi, the Pope's physician, from which we extract the following passages:

"But does not the Pope feel the weight of his ninety years?"

"I can gladly say that he feels quite the contrary way. This year, which has certainly been for him a year of great fatigue, I find him more vigorous than last year. Le XIII. has none of the infirmities which are the torment of persons of his age. His hearing is perfect. A little near-sighted, he wears spectacles, but more often he lifts them up to his forehead or even he finishes by taking them off altogether because they impede him. It is no uncommon thing for me to see him read without spectacles."

"Is his memory always good?"

"It is truly prodigious. No danger of any confusion in his brain. My concern is precisely that he sees and that he studies altogether too many things. A night above all his intellect is at work, and next day his memory furnishes us proofs of its astonishing freshness. Thus some months ago, scarcely risen at half-past six in the morning, he called his secretary and set about dictating to him one after the other ninety Latin verses; in an hour of sleeplessness he had composed them mentally, and his marvelous memory had retained them to the letter."
