LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Two men were killed and eight other passengers seriously injured, three of them probably fatally in Pittsburg on Saturday in a street car accident.

Fire Sunday afternoon did \$60,000 damages to the premises of the Montreal Cotton and Wool Waste Company. The loss is probably covered by insurance.

A number of prominent Conservatives met Mr. Borden Leader of the Opposition and Mrs. Borden at the steamer, when they arrived at Quebec on Friday last. The Leader is reported to be looking the picture of health. He left for the east shortly after his arrival.

Wigton Haco, of the St. Peter's Clydesdale Horse Company, was the winner of first prize at Georgetown exhibition for his best Clydesdale, Shire or Percheron Stallion, any age, registered. He not only won the red ribbon, but elicited general admiration.

Two young men William Hilton of Kenebec and Frank Chadwick were killed at West Main, by a train while crossing the tracks of the Boston and Maine near the station Saturday night. With three or four companions, they started across the track and were unable to get out of the way of the oncoming train.

Charles Duff Miller, Agent-General New Brunswick in London since 1886, fell from a window at Margate and was killed. Miller was born in Ontario in 1854. At the time of his death, Miller was staying in a sanatorium on account of nervous trouble. An attendant was constantly in charge of him but Miller succeeded in eluding him, and making his way to a window. It is assumed that he jumped out, for the body was found in the yard beneath.

Sensation Promised.

Halifax advices of the 3rd say: Sensational developments are expected in the strike situation in Cape Breton tomorrow. Two weeks ago the Dominion Coal Company ordered the arrest of Dan McDonald, president of the United Mine Workers of America in Nova Scotia on a charge of libel, for inserting advertisements in La Patrie of Montreal giving an alleged libelous description of conditions at the company's collieries at Glace Bay. The U. M. W. claim they have information that the company intends to make wholesale arrests with a view of breaking the strike. To offset this move, the U. M. W. officials will swear out information for the arrest of the coal operators of this province. They will charge conspiracy among the operators in keeping up the price of coal claiming the different companies here have an agreement to charge a uniform rate per ton. The U. M. W. has laid information for the arrest of Alex. Johnson, ex-M. P. for Cape Breton, on the charge of original libel. Johnson is proprietor of the Sydney Record, which has throughout the strike sided with the company, and is alleged to have attacked the U. M. W.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

At a meeting of the Halifax Exhibition Commission on Saturday the date for next year's Fair were fixed Sept. 28 to Oct. 6. They will follow Charlottetown.

The Military circuit court at Warsaw Russia has condemned two German subjects to four years and three years in the penitentiary, on a charge of espionage.

A writ for a by-election in Lotbiniere P. Q., has been issued, nomination will be Oct. 18 and election on the 28th. This election is made necessary through the unseating of Mr. Fortier, M. P.

A King's County, N. S., farmer has sold his orchard crop of apples for \$5,000. The buyer gave him a cheque for 1,000 before one apple was picked as a guarantee of the sale.

There is a rumor in Military circles that the entire militia force of the Dominion of Canada will go into camp at Paterson, near Ottawa. It is also said that General French will have charge of the mobilization of the force, and that Lord Kitchener will inspect the men and equipment.—Sydney Record.

Chevalier Marconi, the wireless wizard was at Glace Bay last week in connection with the erection of a new wireless station there. He says that by the first of next year a cheaper rate will be established, especially for wireless cable messages. The new cable rate, he said, would be about ten cents per word.

A new wireless record between Honolulu and San Francisco has been established by operator Phelps of the steamer Alameda. Tied up at her dock at Honolulu, a distance of 2,100 miles from San Francisco, the Alameda has been in communication with a wireless bureau there. Phelps announced the arrival of the Alameda before the cable did.

Before a crowd of twenty-five thousand people, in Montreal on Saturday afternoon, Hans Holmer of Halifax defeated Henry St. Yves in the fall marathon distance, time, 2, 32, 40. This is a new record if the track measures properly, about which some doubt is expressed. St. Yves quit in the twenty-third mile, and doctors who examined him say his heart is affected and he will probably never run again.

Ray Lamphere, who was convicted as an accomplice of the arch-murderer, Mrs. Guinness, has but a few days to live. He is suffering from consumption at Laporte, Indiana. State's attorney Smith is confident that he will make a confession clearing every detail of the Guinness farm mystery. Up to the present he has protested that he knew nothing about how Mrs. Guinness killed and disposed of her victims.

The fall term of the court of appeals opened at Quebec Friday under the presidency of Judges Tremblay, Lavergne, Cross, Archambault and Carroll. There is a large number of cases to be argued this term, one of the principal ones being that of Mr. Jules Fournier, of La Nationalite, who appeals from a judgment of Chief Justice LaSalle, who sentenced him to a term in the Quebec jail for contempt of court.

While posing in a canoe at Amesbury Mass., to have their pictures taken, Joseph Monaghan and his brother Frederick were capsized and drowned in Lake Gardiner, in view of Bella Bay, a young woman friend who was about to snapshot them from shore. The young men could not swim, and although the accident occurred close to the bank, they were unable to get a footing and Miss Bailey was powerless to assist them.

At least nine men were killed and fatally injured in a gas explosion in a colliery at the North Western Improvement Co. near Roslyn Wash. When the explosion occurred a column of fire was thrown hundreds of feet into the air, lighting the plant and adjoining buildings. Under the intense heat the hoist of the shaft crumpled and fell. The cinders were blown in all directions and several buildings in the little mining town took fire.

Mrs. Frank Grover and her two children Katherine and Dorothy, wife and daughters of a farmer living ten miles south of Lee, Alberta, lost their lives in a prairie fire Saturday according to notices received. The mother seems to have seen the fire approaching the home and started with her children for a neighbor's place. The fire overtook them and the children were burned to death, while Mrs. Grover was so badly burned that she died a few hours later. Through the fire district the buildings and crops went up in smoke.

Forty minutes more have been clipped from the trans-Atlantic record by Marconi's New York to Liverpool. The Marconi, which wrested the title from her sister ship, the Lusitania, on her latest trip completed on Friday a record of 2784 knots in 4 days 10 hours and 11 minutes, at an average speed of 26.8 knots. The best previous trip was 4 days 11 hours and 35 minutes and the average speed record heretofore stood at 25.7 knots an hour. The Lusitania's best performance is 4 days 11 hours and 42 minutes.

After Mass on Monday, the 27th ult., the parish of St. Charles, King's County, presided the Rev. Dr. Walker with a well filled choir, after the reading of an address, on the occasion of the transference from the charge of the mission of St. Charles to that of Little Pond. The reverend gentleman in reply very cordially thanked the people for their valuable gift and too flattering address. He referred briefly to the history of the mission, and expressed his confidence in the continued growth and prosperity of St. Charles both spiritual and temporal.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS.

Sister Mary Emmanuel, 35 years, a lay sister of the Precious Blood Monastery Ottawa fell from a ladder last Friday evening and broke her neck. She died instantly. She was a Miss Catherine Bonlet, of Hull prior to entering the order.

In the United States the education of the farmer is receiving consideration. At the last session of the legislature of Kansas the appropriation for Farmer's Institute Work was increased from \$10,500 to \$52,500 and the Institute staff largely increased.

The Dominion Government will be petitioned to coin half cents. These coins of small denomination will be a great boon to poor people who appreciate saving half a cent when articles are frequently quoted for sale with the 1 cent in it.

The Toronto News remarks that 'It is astonishing that Cook should have left his records and instruments in the Arctic circle to be brought home by another man. At the same time it looks like pettiness on Peary's part to have refused to take those proofs of Cook's works on his trip when he came south.'

The Halifax police the other day arrested 42 Chinamen in their gambling dens, Duke Street, and seized all their gambling utensils. The Celestials were engaged when the police suddenly went in on them, in the play of fortune, and also of the more Christian civilization game of poker.

A big bull moose, standing on the track near Paines Junction on Monday forced the morning express from Point du Chene to come to a standstill. The moose was sighted when the train was some distance away and despite repeated blows of the whistle, it did not move for some time after the train had stopped.

A subsidized shipbuilding industry in Canada was one of the things the Canadian Federation of Laborers decided to secure. The fact that Canadian ships have to be constructed in other countries was deprecated, and it has been decided to ask the Dominion Government to take action to have shipyards established in Canada.

Joseph Garretson, managing editor of the Cincinnati Times-Star, who was among the passengers to arrive at New York on the steamship Mauretania last Friday night, brought word from Sir Thomas Lipton that he would sail from England for New York on October 9 to make a tour of the country and to issue a challenge to the New York Yacht Club.

The British steamer Clan MacKintosh, belonging to the Madras Steam Navigation Company, is reported to have blown up at sea. Every man on board with one exception, is said to have perished. The Clan MacKintosh was on her way from Rangoon to Calcutta to be fitted with new boilers. The Clan MacKintosh was of 2,575 tons net register. She was built at Greenock in 1883.

King Edward, in Buckingham Palace will press a button in a couple of weeks which will formally open the Royal Edward Tuberculosis Institute, Montreal. By an ingenious electrical arrangement, connections are made between the Palace and Institute by which the doors will be thrown open and the lights turned on when the King presses the button, and at the same instant a Union Jack will be hoisted on the flag-staff in the Institute garden.

N. A. Rhodes of the great manufacturing establishment of the Royal Canadian Company Amherst N. S. died at his home Thursday morning last, after a brief illness. He had been operated on a few days previously for appendicitis; later complications set in with fatal results, despite the best of medical skill. He was only 58 years of age. Mr. Rhodes was a native of Amherst, at the time and knew nothing of his father's illness. Word was sent to him at Vancouver B. C., where he expected to be on Thursday.

At the Frederick N. B. Exhibition which has just closed, the exhibitors from this Province and their winnings were as follows: Dr. J. T. Jenkins, City lot for standard bred filly two years old; second for Road Mare; Roper Bros City sixteen firsts, four seconds two thirds for Guernsey cattle; C. P. Thorpe, City, two firsts and two seconds; L. A. Haskard, City, seven firsts, T. D. Handley, City, one first and one second for Pouter; besides which every prize for cheese as already stated comes to the province, and a number of places in the horse races. Good for P. E. I.

A curious protest was made recently against the employment of women clerks in the Bank of England. One of the shareholders raised the subject at the half-year meeting of the Court of Governors. 'They should not be here,' he said. 'Women ought not to be in this establishment. They cannot keep a secret you know they cannot. It is impossible.' 'I cannot think the speaker is right,' said R. E. Johnston, the governor, 'in saying that the lady clerks should not be employed at the bank. They are well adapted for the work they have to do.'

The Boston Journal, in referring to the death of Mrs. Emilie Williams who is said to have been a native of P. E. Island says: 'Though she lived practically a pauper's life in the Levee street house with an old friend, Mary Gallagher, nearly \$1000 in cash and four diamond rings worth at least \$400, were found on her person and in the house by the physicians who treated her. For some years she and Mary Gallagher had lived together and all who knew them imagined they had no more money than was necessary to live on. As already stated, Mrs. Williams is making a claim for a share of the money on the ground that Mrs. Williams owed her for three years' work at \$3 a week.'
