OUR TOWN FATHERS.

Report of Proceedings at the Last Meeting.

Oct. 31.
 The Council met this evening the Mayor in the chair. Present—Reeve, 1st and 2nd Deputy Reeves, and Councilors Bingham, Butler, Swanson, Sloan, Nicholson and Jordan.

The Treasurer's statement was read, showing Receipts since last meeting \$2,515.99, Expenditure \$1,904.02, Balance in Bank \$777.37.

A communication from Finance committee. Street Inspectors' report, showing amount of work done during past month, was referred to public works committee.

The report of the sexton showed the number of interments during the month to have been 3 infants and 1 adult.

A communication was received from the Directors of Mechanics' Institute for the usual grant of \$100 and was referred to Finance committee.

A communication from W. H. Skimmings with regard to drain on Stanley-street was referred to Public Works committee.

The petition of Mrs. Hadden, for remission of balance of taxes for 1881, was granted.

The following petitions were referred to the Finance committee: Mrs. Hilliard, Mrs. Burns, Wm. Hemmings, for remission of taxes, and John Dunn for reduction of taxes.

The petition of Mrs. Mary Ann Ames, for relief, was referred to Relief committee.

A number of accounts were referred to Finance committee.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

1. That we have examined the bond given by the collector for \$10,000 with the following sureties: Wm. Cox, Thos. Dark, A. McD. Allan, and Saml. Follock, and have examined the same, and authorized the clerk to hand the roll to the collector, that he might proceed with the collection of taxes. 2. We recommend that the following accounts be paid: Wm. Mitchell, relief, \$6; Henry Cluett, fire dept., \$1.50; John Yule, sundries, \$6.00; Star, printing, \$6.37; D. Ferguson, relief, \$18. Report adopted.

CEMETERY COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

1. That they recommend the purchase from Mr. John Goodall of the following tools for use in the Gode-rich cemetery: Lawn mower, \$6.50; pair of grass and pruning knives, \$2.40; total \$8.90. 2. That we have appointed Wm. Watt to be caretaker of the cemetery temporarily, and have advertised for a permanent caretaker. Mr. Watt to be retained at pleasure of the committee, and to receive the same salary as Mr. Goodall received.

Moved by Jordan, seconded by Swanson that the supply committee procure a dark lantern for the night watchman.

Moved by Campbell, seconded by Bingham, that the cemetery committee have power to repair the caretaker's dwelling at the cemetery.

Council then adjourned.

CHANCERY DIVISION.

High Court of Justice.

This Court met at Gode-rich on Monday Chancery Clerk Boyd presiding. The members of the Bar of the County welcomed his Lordship with the following address:

To His Lordship the Honorable John Alexander Boyd, Chancellor of the High Court of Justice for Ontario.

The members of the County of Huron Bar (within your jurisdiction) deem it fitting that upon this, your first official visit, they should express in some public manner their pleasure at your appointment to the high office of Chancellor, and their belief that your promotion was not only well merited from the leading position to which you had by your ability and industry attained as Counsel, but was also upon every ground eminently satisfactory both to the Bar and the County.

We are familiar with your great ability and success as an advocate and counsel while at the Bar, and as your promotion fits you still in the prime and vigor of life we look forward with great pleasure, and with, we are assured, no vain hope to a long and able discharge by you of your highly important judicial duties; we had the pleasure upon the last similar occasion here of offering our congratulations to your eminent predecessor in office, the present Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal, upon his promotion to that office, we now no less heartily congratulate and welcome you, believing that you will prove yourself no unworthy successor to that most able and revered judge.

His Lordship made a suitable reply.

The following cases were tried:

Scotmer v. Scotmer.—Action for construction of will. Decree—land to be sold and after payment or costs, balance to be paid into court, and \$100 a year to be paid out to Mrs. Mary Scotmer half yearly. M. G. Cameron for plaintiff; Garrow for defendant.

Brookenridge v. Ontario Loan & Debiture Company.—An action for specific performance of an agreement made by the defendants to convey to the plaintiff a farm in Colborne, and for damages for delay in giving possession to the plaintiff. Judgment was given ordering specific performance, and referring it to the Master to assess the damages sustained by the plaintiff. Garrow and Seager for plaintiff; McGee, of London, for defendant.

Matheson v. Barker.—An action to compel the defendant, MacPherson, solicitor of Kinross, to account to the widow and administratrix of the late Angus Matheson, for the price of farm sold by MacPherson as trustee for Matheson; and the proceeds of which the plaintiff alleges the defendant MacPherson never accounted for or paid over. Judgment in plaintiff's favor for MacPherson to account, and reference to the Master to take the account. Seager for plaintiff; Davis for defendant; Barker, Garrow for defendant; MacPherson.

Waddell v. Sparling.—Action for recovery of money loaned to the firm of Waddell & Sparling, Seaforth. Dismissed with costs. Garrow for deft.

Welsh v. Standard Ins. Co.—Action for recovery of insurance on property destroyed by fire in Brussels. Dismissed without costs, premium to be returned. Garrow for plff; Cameron for deft.

Brown v. Shaffer.—To obtain possession of disputed personal property. Judgment for plff for costs. Doyle for plff; Garrow for deft.

This closed the cases before the court.

In the suit of Gen. Rossier against the Canada Pacific Railway, for malicious prosecution. A verdict was returned for the plaintiff for \$2,600.
