(From the London "Times.") There are signs that some day we may have a sober England, not one in which drunkenness is unknown, but one in which it has ceased to be a social evil of the first order; certainly one in which persons proved to be unable to exercise control over themselves will not be free to live lives of gross intemperance and to rear children certain to follow in the footsteps of their parents. Difficulties and prejudices still obstruct the path of reform. But never was there more hope of reforming them than now. We do not attach supreme importance to convictions for drunkenness as a test of intemperance. Many causes affect the fibres, particularly changes in regard to the administration of the law by the police, who are sometimes lax, sometimes active and rigorous. Economic causes swell or contract the figures. A period of high wages or of frequent fluctuations in them may falsify the experience acquired in other times. It is manifest that if there be a doctrine in drunkenness it is not universal.

Underground Jerusalem. Hezekiah's Tunnel Explored. No more interesting task awaits the twentieth century archaeologist than the systematic exploration of the network of ancient tunnels, conduits, and cisterns which lie under Jerusalem. Three years ago a small party of British investigators set to work upon this task, beginning with the examination of the Virgin's Well and the famous tunnel which runs from it for 1,700 feet under the rock of Mount Sion or Ophel to the Pool of Siloam. The first account of the results obtained by three years of unwearied exploration is given by "H.V." in this week's Field. The tunnel in question was made, according to the Book of Chronicles by the Jewish King Hezekiah. In it was discovered thirty years ago the earliest known Hebrew inscription of any length. This tells how, while the workers were still at their task cutting through the rock from both ends, when three cubits yet parted them. On clearing the Virgin's Well and breaking through a mass of concrete the explorer discovered a fresh conduit cut in the living rock, some 6 feet deep, which led to a small cavern. The cavern was choked with debris, which was removed and examined. It consisted of mud, potsherds, and fragments of jars, all ancient. The pottery found was in no case as late as the ninth century, B. C., and some of it was much earlier. An Israelite lamp of the eleventh century B. C. was recovered in almost perfect condition from the mud above the later fragments of pottery. Further instalments will describe the clearing and examination of Hezekiah's tunnel, and the evidence obtained in the course of it that 2,500 years before David, Jerusalem was a Jebusite city. It was the work of this party of archaeologists which led to wild tales among the population of Jerusalem that Englishmen were excavating the tunnels under the site of Solomon's Temple and the Mosque of Omar to carry off the treasures which Jeremiah was said to have hidden. For these tales there was never the smallest foundation. Paris, September 28.—The first of the hoop skirts, which have been revived by the Paris modistes, appeared on the street to-day. The wearer of the ornithine gown was followed by a crowd of the curious, who made audible comments.
