The British Government now consulting the British minis at Pekin regarding the desirabi y of sending troops, but it does not eem that foreigners are now in reater danger than hitherto.

WASHINGTON, Nov. Admiral Murdock, of the United tates Navy in the Asiatic Station, as sent two of his ships up the Yang se Kiang River, from Shanghai to Janking, where General Chang, with he flower of the Imperial army, is esieged by the revolutionaries. As nany warships of other nations are there. If the bombardme he city cannot be prevented, the few emaining foreigners there can find efuge on the warships during the ghting. It is not expected that the roops will be despatched from Matila to China until another meeting of he Council of Ministers at Pekin.
