What Steamer Will Replace the s.s. Fiona, Which Has Been Taken Off the Bait Service to Take the Governor Around?

**RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE BOARD OF TRADE, June 14th, 1912:—**  
Bait Act.

**RESOLVED.**—In view of the several infringements of this Act last year, and of the very large catch of Norwegian fish this year, the Council are of opinion that the Government should provide such facilities for the strict and proper enforcement of the provisions of the Bait Act as may be necessary, and understanding that at present there is no steamer engaged in this service, the Council urge the employment immediately of a steamer suitable for this purpose, as necessary for the welfare of the Colony.

Dear Sir,—I am in receipt of your letter of this day's date, covering Resolution passed by the Council of the Board of Trade to-day in reference to the strict enforcement of the provisions of the Bait Act. Permit me to say that the Minister of Finance has already been authorized to arrange for a temporary steamer to take the place of the s.s. Fiona in the carrying out of this work while the latter steamer is engaged by His Excellency the Governor.
