for Over 4,000 years.


London, June 10 .- The archaeological excavations under the direction of Daninos Pasha has now fully revealed the Necropolis of Heliopolis, which day, and that it is a chance of a lifewas the intellectual centre of Egypt for over four thousand years, and the place where Moses received the sacerdotal and military training which enabled him to lead the Israelites out of their Egyptian bondage.

The Necropolis is situated in the desert a trifle more than three miles eastward of the Matarish Obelisk. The burial places cut from the rocks of the Arabian range were from 65 to 220 feet deep. They were covered with sand, the removal of which revealed ummies of human bodies and the skeletons of sacred animals and birds. ndamager Ibis eggs were also found.
