## Sensational Arrest Made.

On the information of Dr. Grenfell, Charles H. Karnopp, Superintendent of the Seamen's Institute, was taken into custody on Tuesday evening. He is now out on \$12,000.00 bonds. The accused is charged with misappropriating of \$1,000.00 belonging to the Mission Funds.

The first intimation of the shortage Dr. Grenfell had was when the chartered auditors submitted their statement of accounts to him. The Doctor acquainted the Minister of Justice Department of the matter and instructions were given to the police for the arrest of Karnopp, who shortly after being brought to the lockup, was liberated on \$12,000.00 bonds. The securities were—\$6,000 given by himself, and \$3,000 each offered by Dr. Macpherson and A. Templeton. An enquiry will begin to-day. Mr. Karnopp is being defended by Messrs. Furlong and Conroy.

## New Company TAKES OVER HALIFAX COLD STORAGE.

The North Atlantic Fisheries Limited, Acquires a Highly Profitable Enterprise Which Will be Enlarged and Given Additional Capital.

One of the most prosperous enterprises in Nova Scotia and one showing remarkably rapid growth in the scope of its operations and in its earning power, has been the Halifax Cold Storage Company, established six years ago by Arthur Boutillier of Halifax. Its success was little short of phenomenal.

The North Atlantic Fisheries, Limited, has been organized to take over the company as a going concern, adding to its capital and extending the business plants.

The Halifax Cold Storage Company built a plant in Halifax in 1906, another has been built at Port Hawkesbury, and there are also buying stations at Canso and Petit de Grat. The business of the company, including the bait for fishermen, has far outgrown the capacity of the plants, capable as they are of handling 20,000,000 pounds of fish per annum. The growth has been constantly steady, till now the company's products find a market across the continent to Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria. West of the maritime provinces the sales in 1907 were \$22,976.36. Next year they had more than doubled and each succeeding year an almost similar proportion of increase was affected, till last year the sales had reached \$219,524.95—a wonderful showing in six years.

There seems no doubt that this increase will continue. That it will to so is the opinion of Mr. Boutillier, the president and managing director of the company, whose excellent management and business skill has largely created the industry, and who will continue to direct the management of the North Atlantic Fisheries, Limited.

The Halifax Cold Storage company's net earnings in 1910, as reported by R. Carter, chartered accountant, were \$20,395, increasing to \$24,465 for 1911, and amounting to \$35,155 for 1912—more than sufficient to pay the dividends on the total preferred stock now being issued by the North Atlantic Fisheries Limited.

It is to be borne in mind that the new company will have \$225,000 additional working capital, and the increased profits derivable from this. President Boutillier estimates, should make a total of fully \$60,000 in net earnings—with every prospect of an increase year by year.

With Mr. Boutillier will be associated on the board of directors in the management of the North Atlantic Fisheries, Limited, a group of practical business men.

The capitalization of the company consists of \$1,000,000 preferred shares and \$1,000,000 common stock, authorized, and \$500,000 preferred and \$500,000 common issued. The common stock of the old company has been selling at \$150 per share.

F. B. McCurdy and Co. elsewhere in this paper are offering \$200,000 of the Preferred stock of the new company with 40 per cent bonus of common stock at par.
