One Publican Loses License. The adjourned annual meeting of the Licensing Board was continued in the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon. His Honor Mayor Ellis presided and amongst these present were Judge Conroy, I. G. Sullivan, J. P. Blackwood, Esq. and several haveners.

Fenelon, on behalf of Albert O'Reilly, who runs a licensed house on Water Street West, applied for a renewal of his client's license. He emphasized Mr. O'Reilly's clean record and that if he was not allowed it contended it would leave a stigma on the publican.
Mr. Fenelon stated that Mr. O'Reilly had \$5,000 worth of stock on hand and requested that the license be renewed r one year in order to have the stock disposed of. This being refused Mr C'Reilly proposed that he would vol-

untarily surrender his license in May next if granted it now. The Inspector General said thought the license should not be newed anyhow, as the location of the premises was too close to the Railway Station. He referred to the fatal accident at the Round House last spring and which in the Inspector' opinion was caused by drink. While he regretted that the publican would suffer monetary loss, yet he thought that "Prevention was better than cure," and that the removal of the temptation would prevent a recur

ce of the accident. As regards the renewal of Mr. T. Wall's license I. G. Sullivan withdrew his objection to it, Mr. Wall, having through Mr. W. J.
