To-day Shacktown is getting more from what funds it has than most people in the wealthier parts of Toronto. And the secret of the change lies to a great extent in Peter Bryce the Methodist preacher. Shacktown is more than a suburb. It is a suburb it is ple cooperate in the solving of a grea many of their common troubles. The Anglicans, the Presbyterians, th

fethodists, and almost all the religi ous denominations are represente among these people. Each church a sort of center, not only of religiou and social activities, but of the econo mic life of the district. But first an oremrost of them all is the little lethodist Church where Peter Byroonceived and carried out his ideas.

This man Peter Bryce is a tall spare, quiet-spoken, mild-mannered man with a genius for helping people to help themselves. He was one of the most active workers in the discretization of 1907 when trict in the hard times of 1907 when he was only a student looking after his mission. Since being ordained he has cointinued in that district, and ideas as to organization, etc. the relief work, he has applied to al most every phase of life in his region After the great stress was over, and hen the men of the region were one ore able to obtain work, Bryce say that without strenuous effort on his part, and the part of other minister in the place. The idea was this: lon before winter was at hand he and the congregation were to form a club to be called "The Coal Club." This clut would receive deposits from its members of anything from a cent to a dollar—more if offered—to be held until the winter season when it would be applied in the purchasing of coal for the club members. In other words, instead of buying coal at top prices and in small lots, the congregation was to buy in wholesale quantities and divide the coal according to the amount invested in the club funds have formits. pefore winter was at hand he and th titles and divide the coal according to the amount invested in the club funds by each family. The club was formed in May and a contract was made with a coal dealer for a large consignment. During the summer the members paid in such little sums as they could spare from time to time. They could not always get very far ahead toward a winter supply of coal, but in many cases they were able to start the coal-burning season with a fair supply ahead. About \$1,300 was paid into the club, and the coal was sold to the members at a price fifty cents per

All Sorts of Clubs,

True, but the club does a great work. It purchases the articles mentioned in its constitution direct from the wholesalers. Last winter two hunired and thirty quilts and blankets were brought into the district homes n this way—cheaper than they could have been obtained otherwise. The same is the story of the Shoe Club, which watches the bargain sales in he big stores and buys the cheap ootwear by the job lot. It is still in the experimental stage. o "visiting" for their vacations, are ble to enjoy an outing at a hear-by ble to enjoy an outing at a hear-by ummer resort. For this purpose a sig ten-roomed house was obtained o which four families at a time ould spend a week's holiday each. These clubs and the handling of he funds require some thought and abor. Each club is in charge of two vomen, and works in connection with he other activities of the church. The hurch has become a sort of mother additionally and additionally and additionally and additionally and a sort of mother and father to the community. In adition to these clubs, there is a labor ureau, a library, a men's orchestra f sixteen pieces, occasional movicture shows, handball and base ttend meetings, and a church ation, issued once a month and sold by the boys of the Sunday school. There are people who would say that he is doing something in addi-tion to this. He is inculcating habtion to this. He is inculcating habits of thrift into people who have not had opportunity to learn to be hrifty. He is making businesslike itizens, who, instead of becoming nembers of a slum, dependent upon tharity in the hard seasons, have bought their own land and have built their home in spare moments. And, like a few other men, he takes no credit to himself.


