The damage done the railway was most severe from Topsail to near Duff's station. In one place the sea tore away about 500 feet of the road bed, track and all. Messrs. Reid are doing their utmost to have repairs made with despatch, and if the storm moderates they hope to have everything in running order by Sunday.

PREPARING FOR STRIKE.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30. The Government is preparing clothes-to-day to meet the coal strike due to start Saturday. While order after order popped out with startling war-time swiftness, the long arm of the law reached out to protect the public and those miners willing to remain at work in the face of Union commands to quit. The most drastic of all moves during the day was the order of the railroad administration for the seizure of coal in transit for roads requiring it, with rationing of stocks on hand to essential industries. So far as the Government is able to prevent there will be no profiteering.

CHINESE BANKERS ACTIVE.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30. Backed by the Chinese Government, a bank, capitalized at \$10,000,000, now being established in New York, will establish branches in Vancouver, Montreal, Seattle, Washington and San Francisco, according to an announcement made by Hsu Un Yuan, Privy Councillor of the Chinese Cabinet, Tokyo, here to-day on his way home. Mr. Hsu was formerly President of the Bank of China and is returning to Peking with a number of American bankers who hope to arrange a credit system between China and America. The New York bank will be known as the American Industrial Bank of China.

EXPLOSION ON BATTLESHIP.

TOKIO, Oct. 25. The manoeuvres of the entire Japanese navy, in which the Emperor participated, were marred by an explosion on the battleship Hyuga, in Tokyo Bay. Fourteen men were killed and thirteen injured.

Vessel Driven Off.

Friday evening the schooner Excelsa, was in King's Cove loading pine logs, when she was blown out of the harbor and at 4 p.m. rounded Cape Bonavista. Seven men from King's Cove besides the crew were on board at the time. As yet there is no further report.

LATER.
We learn the S.S. Susu was ordered by the Government to leave here at once to try and intercept the schr. Excelsa, driven out of King's Cove, and reported in another column.

Schr. Abandoned.

The schooner Godwill belonging to John Hurley, Cupids, is ashore four miles from Cappahayden. She was on her way from Labrador and met the S. E. storm Tuesday night when off Conception Bay. When the wind came to N.W. she hauled in towards the land and springing a leak had to be abandoned. There were 13 men and 1 woman on board. They were landed safely. The Marine & Fisheries Department made immediate arrangements for comfort and they are expected here by train to-day.
