Mr. McNeil was hurled to the floor almost senseless. Immediately the terrible fumes began to eat their way into his lungs and eyes and burn great patches of his body.

Struggling desperately to retain consciousness, and by almost superhuman effort, Mr. McNeil crawled his way to the doorway and was saved. Mr. Langley and Mr. Munn were evidently instantly killed.

Mr. McNeil attributes his escape from their tragic fate to the fact that the force of the explosion was exerted chiefly on the opposite side of the cylinder from the side on which he was standing.

The injured man is a son of Mr and Mrs. J. K. McNeil, of Glace Bay. He has resided in Sydney for some time.—Sydney Record, July 12.
