



along the Gander River. The largest head seen was only a fifteen-pointer. and at no one time were the caribou seen in larger numbers than five. "It you want to preserve your Caribou," said Mr. Banks to the Telegram to-day, "you must protect your stags and lessen the number of barren does." Mr. Banks, who is a Civil Servant in the Federated Malay States, where he has shot elephants, tigers and other lig game, left for the Gander on Oct. 3rd and with a good guide, went in search of caribou. He was greatly surprised at the scarcity of the animals and even the guide could not account for it. At one time they traversed twenty miles without seeing one head and, when game was seen, the majority proved to be barren does. Not one head was seen worth shooting. In some places the party came across the remains of caribou and observed signs of traps around them. It is possible that the heavy snow storms experienced in the interior recently may have been responsible for the scarcity of caribou. In no other way could it be accounted for. Meat hunters whom Mr. Banks met had got hardly anything. Whilst his trip was a trying one to one used to a warmer clime, Mr. Banks greatly enjoyed it, although he experienced natural disappointment at not obtaining a good head. He leaves by the

ESTIMATE OF 10-000,000 CORDS AS ANNUAL PRODUCTION.

Taking as his text a quotation from an article in the "Pulp and Paper" Number of the Financial Post, which stated that 10,000 cords of pulpwood could be produced from a planted area of 50 miles, T. Kennard Thomson, the well-known consulting engineer of New York, brings forward again his plan for the establishment of "A 100 Years' Peace Park" between Canada and the United States. His suggestion was that the Governments of the two counries each buy a strip of land ten miles wide, making a total width of twenty miles, from Lake Superior to the Pacific Ocean, about 1500 miles long, creating an international park and forest and home for wild animals, birds and fish. This would be a "wind break," would improve the climate, and increase the value of the adjoining land, and in addition would be a profit-producer through the sale of timber, furs, animals, fish, etc. Taking the basis of the estimate in these columns Mr. Thomson estimates that this park would yield from ten to twelve millions of cords.-Forbes Magazine.

Says End of Depression Due in February.

That the limit of business depression in the United States will be reached about February 1 to 15, was the opinion expressed by George E. MacIlwain. of the Babson Statistical Organization speaking before the Chamber de Commerce at Montreal on "The Economic Situation." By means of a chart, compiled from fifteen such business indicators as bank clearings, foreign trade figures, etc., Mr. MacIlwain illustrated the rise and fall of business in the United States since 1903. Canada's experience could be regarded in the same light, as conditions here were similar to those across the boster, with the one exception that changes here came from thirty to sixty days later.

The turning point, when reached said Mr. MacIlwain, would not mean a sudden wave of prosperity. It would simply mean that from that day onward the business world would gain day by day; very slight gains, probably. And it would be better that the gain should be small and steady, for the sonner the world of business learnt the folly of forcing prosperity to unnatural peaks the sooner would true, steady, sane prosperity and progressiveness be reached. If nothing serious occurred to delay it, ultimate high level of prosperity would be reached in two or three years.
