Brazilian Exhibition, and unless we  
make preparations now, we will per-  
mit them to get a great advantage

over us. Unless we show the Brazilian  
authorities that we take an interest  
in their affairs we shall be rated as  
a "back number", and there will be  
no use for us to look for any con-  
cessions in trade with that country for  
years to come. Let us get into this Ex-  
hibition enthusiastically and show  
Brazil that we are a live country and

determined to increase our business  
with them. I am sure when we look  
at this in the proper light, we shall  
readily perceive that we cannot afford  
to take a back seat when our best  
customer is celebrating the Centenary  
Anniversary of their Independence.

## A River's Eccentricities.

The Colville, the largest river in  
Alaska, emptying into the Arctic  
Ocean, for much of its course lies  
higher than one side of its own val-  
ley, and is gradually sliding down  
hill, writes Robert F. Wilson. The  
river flows north parallel to an east-  
ern range of hills and actually par-  
way up the slope of the hills, so that  
if the stream's western bank were  
cut, the water would abandon the  
present bed and flow down into the  
bottom of the valley.

The western side of the river is  
deep, where the current is eating in-  
to the bank year after year, but the  
eastern side shallows out into a  
broad, stony beach which shows by  
its great width how far the river has  
already travelled sideways.

The explanation of the Colville's  
eccentric conduct is that after it  
formed its bed and valley, as a nor-  
mally behaved river does, there was  
a later contortion of the earth's  
crust, lifting the stream bodily par-  
way up the side of the slope. Ever  
since then the river has been trying  
to get down to its old level again.
