Good Sign of Fish in Placentia Bay.

MR. W. J. WALSH RECEIVED THE FOLLOWING MESSAGES YESTERDAY.

Cape St. Mary's, June 19.—Fish are plentiful St. Brice's and along Cape Shore. No salt.

Placentia, June 19.—Dories and boats getting five to seven quintals daily from Point Verde to St. Brice's. Very little salt on shore, only about 25-hogsheads here.

IGNATIUS COLLINS.
St. Brice's, June 19.—Fish plentiful here to Ship Cove, small stock of salt since last year almost used. Very little landed to date. Advise if any possible chance of craft coming this way.

Placentia, June 19.—Dories and boats doing remarkably well Cape Shore. Only four fishing from Point Verde. Had average six quintals today. Yesterday bumper jacks fishing from here getting all they can handle. Present indications point to a good fishery along Cape Shore and in the Bay. Understand no salt on shore, none here or Argentina.

Yesterday we published a similar message from St. Brice's received by Mr. Sinnott. It is evident that fish has struck in along the Cape Shore and other sections of the district but owing to the scarcity of salt the fishermen are greatly hampered in catching same. We understand Messrs. Walsh, Sullivan and Sinnott are working assiduously to-day in an effort to have a quantity of salt sent by schooner by the first opportunity available.

Abundance of Fish.

Mr. James Bindon received a message from Placentia this morning, stating that fish had "struck in" in abundance from Cape St. Mary's to Placentia, some dories securing as high as 10 qts. daily.

PRESENTED TO HIS EXCELLENCY SIR WILLIAM ALLARDYCE ON THE OCCASION OF HIS FIRST OFFICIAL VISIT TO HARBOR GRACE.

To his Excellency Sir William Lamond Allardyce, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor, and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

May it Please Your Excellency:—We, the citizens of the town of Harbor Grace, extend to Your Excellency a right hearty, cordial and sincere welcome on this, the occasion of your first official visit to our town. Your Excellency comes to us as the personal representative of his Majesty King George V. and it is proper that that love for and loyalty to our King should find expression in our welcome to you. Newfoundland proudly claims the distinction of being the oldest colony of that combination of free countries, the British Empire, of which King George is gladly hailed as ruler. The relations existing between this colony and the Mother Country have been most intimate, and that generous and maternal spirit displayed towards us by the Mother Country increases our loyalty to our King, who has come to be the symbol of democratic Government, constitutional liberty and absolute freedom.

In Your Excellency's visit we recognize the desire on your part of becoming acquainted with the people whom you are appointed to govern, and of knowing the conditions which generally obtain throughout the colony. Your visit, then, will have the immediate result of strengthening the bond of interest between a free people and their recognized rulers. This human relationship should exist. By the engendering and fostering of this spirit of common interest, our love, loyalty, patriotism and devotion towards our King and his representative are increased and the continuance of our lives and cherished institutions assured.

Newfoundland is indeed greatly privileged in having as her Governor one who has had such a wide and varied experience in imperial and colonial affairs as Your Excellency. We are confident that this experience applied to our country's affairs will be productive of most beneficial results, and that under your wise government our colony will come safely through the period of depression and uncertainty through which we are now passing.

It is with great pleasure, too, that we welcome Lady Allardyce, a lady whose philanthropic activities and whose general interest in all welfare and betterment movements have merited for her the praise, the love and the gratitude of the peoples with whom she has been associated.

We again wish to welcome Your Excellency and Lady Allardyce to our town and to assure Your Excellency of our continued loyalty to his Most Gracious Majesty through you, his representative.

Weekly Rotary Luncheon.

The usual weekly Luncheon of the Rotary Club was held at Wood's West End Restaurant yesterday. Rotarian Harry Cowan presiding. It was announced that a generous response had been made to the Rotarians' appeal for funds to carry out their ideas in connection with Play Ground facilities, and equipment for Bannerman and Victoria Parks will arrive here at an early date.

The speaker of the day was Dr. W. W. Blackall, who selected as his topic "Canada—Some Impressions." After expressing his appreciation of the work performed by the Rotary Club in connection with the Boy's Life Survey of the City and commenting on the value of this survey from the standpoint of all who are interested in the development of our future citizens; Dr. Blackall, in a very happy and interesting address, told of the impressions left with him during his recent visit to Canada. He could not fail but be impressed with the interest taken by citizens generally in the development of their respective cities, and could not help contrasting same with the lack of interest taken in Newfoundland in practically all matters pertaining to the welfare and progress of the city. He spoke of the work being done in Toronto and other large cities towards making these towns a pleasure to the eye, and instanced the fact that the City of Toronto had voted \$70,000 a year in addition to private amounts being spent by bodies of citizens for the purpose of making the city a more attractive place to live in. He referred to the wonderful libraries in evidence everywhere, and in one city visited, seventeen libraries were available for the use of its citizens. A pleasing feature was the special boys' and girls' library where suitable literature for the younger generation could be obtained, and which he considered was absolutely essential to every community. In speaking of Higher Education, he found that our neighboring Dominion had over 40,000 pupils enrolled for courses that cannot be taught here, and in this connection Newfoundland had only 124 pupils in various colleges abroad or a percentage of 43 of the total enrollment, as compared with 51 in Canada.

A special appeal was made to the Rotarians in connection with the school work carried on at White Bay during the summer months, as two of the staff who were expected to teach there the coming summer were unable to make the trip, and he asked if any Rotarians knew of any relative or friend who would be prepared to go to White Bay and teach during the summer months that they communicate with him.

A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the speaker, and the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

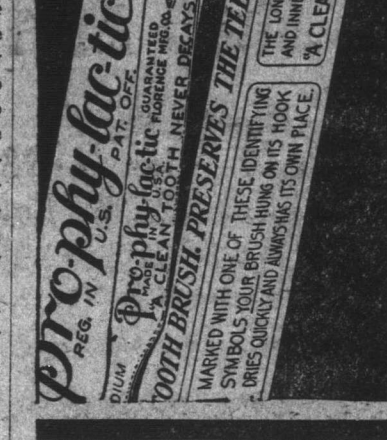

Rhodes Scholarship for 1924.

The election of the Rhodes Scholar for 1924 will be completed in the last week of September next, when candidates must be prepared to appear before the Committee.

Applications with ten typewritten copies of certificates and recommendations must be lodged with the undersigned not later than Saturday the 15th of September next.

The following are the conditions under which candidates are eligible to compete:—

- They must be British subjects and unmarried.
- They or their parents must have been domiciled in the colony for five years immediately preceding the selection.
- They must have completed their second year at some recognized degree-granting University or College before going into residence at Oxford.
- They must have passed their thirteenth birthday, but not have passed their twenty-fifth birthday on October first of the year for which they are selected. (Birth certificates must be submitted).

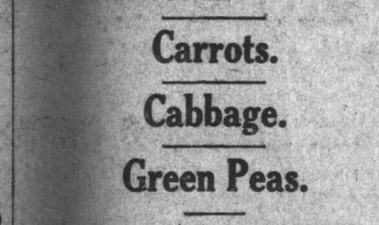
