ingredient and shake often. When the bottle is half full, cork it securely and leave until the next day, when the same procedure should be followed until the bottle is full. It is important to mix the perfume thoroughly with the crystals by shaking often and not filling the bottle too

full at first. The salts should be "dyed" rather highly as the colour fades a little after a short while.
