The coins are propelled, one at a me, by an ingenious automatic arm, time, by an ingenious automatic arm, on toes small pan. Then they fall into one of three compartments; Light, Heavy, or Correct. The faulty coins are then removed for correction. These wonderful balances, which weigh to the merest fraction, are capable of dealing with about forty coins per minute.

It is a big drop from exacting mathematical tests conducted with rigorus precision to tests conducted solely by the brains of man; but the last two tests are so carried out. The first, known as the "ringing" test, is carried out by youths.

In a small "audition-room" a youth sits with a sort of anvil between his knees, and a large tray of coins on the right. Gathering a handful in each hand, he dexterously flips them on to the anvil, and from whence they slide by force of gravity into another tray. His trained ear is able to deect any faulty ring in a coin.

Watching The Coins Go By. The last examination of our coins is known as the "viewing" test. As, in the former test, human ears were the factor, so in this case, human eve-sight is the adjudicator. At each end of a never-ending band a man sits, and coins are distributed all over the band. Each man strains his eyes as the coins go by and removes any

Bad color, chipped edge, and had printing are among the faults for which coins are condemned. The re-maining good coins are gathered into lags for distribution.
