## Chancellor's Budget Proposals Anticipated by the Press

### Balfour Succeeds Curzon as President of the Council.—Ex-Kaiser Overjoyed at News of Hindenburg's Victory.

**LONDON, April 27.**—The news of the political changes in the British Cabinet is expected of Field Marshal Lord Balfour, as President of the Council, by former Prime Minister Lloyd George, who has been on a holiday, says a despatch to the Star from Southampton. Mr. Lloyd George is quoted as saying, "I think there has been a change in the British Government, and I do not think it is a change which will do anything to the credit of the Government. **EX-KAISER PLEASED.**

**LONG DEBATE NEARING END.**  
**OTTAWA, April 27.**—The debate on the Budget will probably terminate during the early hours of Friday morning. Party whips are endeavoring to make Thursday's sitting of the House conclude in a division on the Budget, but as there are some twenty members still who wish to speak, the last few hours of the debate will probably be crowded with short speeches.

**AUSTRALIA ORDERS SEAPLANES.**  
**MELBOURNE, April 27.**—(Canadian Press Cable, via Reuters.)—Four seaplanes, of the seagull type, are being ordered to the Australian Air Force, at a cost of approximately \$2,000 each.

**ITALIAN AVIATOR FLYING TO JAPAN.**  
**BUSHIRE, Persia, April 27.**—The Italian aviator, Commander De Pinedo, arrived this afternoon from Bagdad, on a flight to Japan and Australia. De Pinedo, using a hydro-airplane, started from Rome last Tuesday.

**TRADE TREATY.**  
**OTTAWA, April 27.**—R. H. Ross, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Melbourne, who is now in Ottawa, is to leave for Australia to conduct negotiations in regard to the Canadian-Australian Trade Treaty. It was announced by Premier King at the House of Commons to-day.

**ARMSTRONG TO PROCEED.**  
**OTTAWA, April 27.**—Coordination and extension of the present relief efforts and a telegraphic appeal to Premier Armstrong of Nova Scotia, on the fact finding commission proposed by himself to be appointed immediately, were the outstanding decisions of the national conference of officers of welfare and service organizations which convened in Ottawa this morning to consider the situation among the miners and their families in the coalfields area of Nova Scotia.

**KINDNESS REPAID.**  
**ST. JOHN, N.B., April 27.**—Spring from a watery grave Daniel Brock, the man who gave him a position last fall, "Tommy" Williams, a local boxer, effected a thrilling rescue about midnight Saturday, while working as a member of a longshore gang unloading raw sugar from the steamer Spes at the Atlantic Sugar Refinery wharf here. To-day, Brock blessed the day that led the steamer to him for a job. Williams, who was at the wharf as he was going down the river in the murky waters to meet the ship's tide and the wharf.

**EXPOSES GRAFT IN DETROIT.**

### QUEBEC HAS A CLAIM.

**OTTAWA, April 27.**—The Quebec Harbor Commission has put in a bill totalling \$5,122,109, representing a dollar a head with accrued interest for every immigrant landed in Quebec since 1880. The years 1823-24 and 1824-25 are deducted in the account. The accrued interest amounts to \$2,822,138.

### C. N. R. LAYING OFF EMPLOYEES.

**WINNIPEG, April 27.**—Two hundred junior engineers, employed on trains operating out of Winnipeg, will be laid off permanently this spring, by the Canadian National Railway, it was learned officially here to-day. This action, it was stated, is the result of general business depression reflected in reduced traffic from local railway yards.

### TO STABILIZE EXCHANGE.

**WASHINGTON, April 27.**—An arrangement by which the New York Federal Reserve Bank will buy pound sterling bills in the open market, at the request of the Bank of England, is looked upon by Secretary Mellon as a desirable means of stabilizing exchange, and likely to prove beneficial to the trade and commerce of both nations.

### HINDENBURG'S ELECTION REGARDED AS A BLUNDER.

**WASHINGTON, April 27.**—While it has been realized by those who have been watching the progress of election closely that the German war hero was certain to pole a very heavy vote, few had been inclined to think he actually would be elected. As his triumph is certain to mean difficult period for Germany until it is clear just what change in the Government it means. There can be no question, despite official silence that has been maintained here with regard to the German election, that both the Government and diplomatic observers in Washington feel that election of Hindenburg is a blunder.

### TO SERVE SECOND TERM.

**OTTAWA, April 27.**—It is understood on good authority that Baron Byng will be invited to serve a second term as Governor General of Canada. His term expires on July 19-26.

### TWO DEAD IN AUTO CRASH.

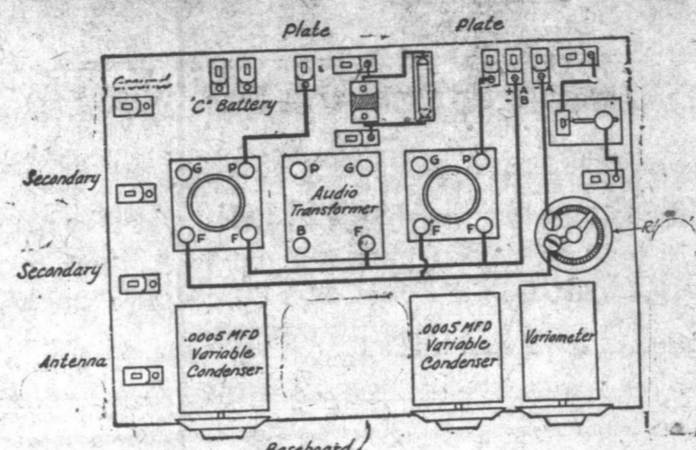
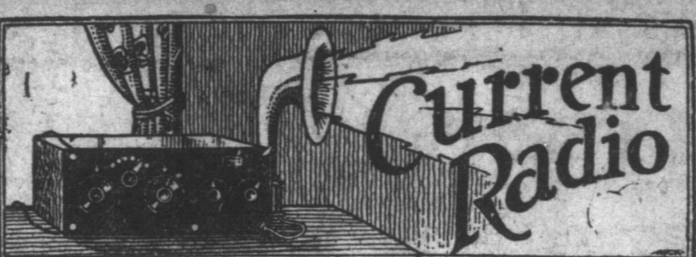

### French Govt. Monopolies

Revenue derived from the sale of matches and automatic lighters in France totalled 15,660,000 francs for the first two months of this year, showing an appreciable increase over revenue collected during the same period in 1924 which was then considered a record at 11,852,000 francs. The sale of tobacco, which is another Government monopoly, did not however, according to advices received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its French Information Service, produce quite as much revenue this year as during January and February 1924, the figures being respectively 301,926,000 francs and 322,301,000 francs.

### Canadian Tobacco Products

**OTTAWA, Ont.—(Can. Press)—**Products of Canada's tobacco factories in 1923, are valued at \$59,840,010 in a return issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Of these Quebec factories made nearly fifty-four million dollars worth. Cigarettes were the most valued product, their value being \$23,964,031. Smoking tobacco is valued at over eighteen millions and cigars ten and a half millions. Cigarettes ran to \$872,585 and the sale of by-products made about \$180,000.
