The Sun Eclipsed for Nearly Seven

An eclipse of the sun, visible only in part of the eastern hemisphere, took place on the 18th, of greater magnitude than has been seen for many hundred years. According to astronomical calculations, a similar one will not take place again for centuries to come. A number of favourable circumstances have combined to render this one of the most remarkable astronomical events of the century, and an intellectual treat to man of science, such as is rarely accorded to him. On the 1st of July, the sun was in its greatest apogee, and if during the weeks that have intervened the apogee has somewhat lessened, it is still so great as to make the sun's diameter appear comparatively small. About midnight the moon, on the contrary, was at its greatest perigee, which makes its diameter appear extraordinarily large. The new moon took place six hours afterwards, and, in addition to this unusual coincidence, the moon being in the ascending node of its course threw its shadow over the equator, so that the eclipse not only covered the greatest possible space on the earth, but in those places where it took place at noon the diameter of the moon appeared still larger, by which means the duration of the eclipse was prolonged, while the surface of the earth, which here reaches its greatest speed of linear rotation, and following the disk of the moon's shadow with greater velocity than at any other point, must have prolonged the whole phenomenon considerably. In consequence of so many combining circumstances, the zone of the total eclipse covered an area of nearly 2,000 miles in glength, and 30 miles in width. In places where the phenomenon reached its highest point the duration of the eclipse was six minutes and fifty seconds.
