

Editorial Items.

THE LAST SHIFT.—The only point at all worth noticing in the Herald's silly rejoinder to our remarks on the County Printing contract question is a trumped up charge that we last year advertised the Debuture By-law in the Daily instead of the Weekly edition. So we did, but why? Simply because the County authorities gave a new rendering of the law by instructing us to insert it three calendar months instead of the thirteen consecutive weeks, as we had previously done in advertising all previous By-laws of the same nature, and that when so instructed there was not sufficient time to advertise it for that period in the Weekly, and to make it legal it had consequently to be inserted in the Daily. The Finance Committee had all the facts before them, and sanctioned the alteration by passing the account. We were prepared to carry out our agreement to the letter, as we had done on all previous occasions, but we acted on the instructions from the County Solicitor, who we presume is a much better authority in these matters than the conceited prigs who run the Herald. The Herald's miserable shifts to uphold its position are truly contemptible, for this is the only very small mole-hill which they have manufactured out of the huge mountain at first conjured up.

The Government's Municipal Loan Fund scheme will be introduced next week. Of the 46 defaulting municipalities, 26 of whom were notified, only nine were represented at the meeting, which took place at Toronto on Wednesday. No business was transacted—it being determined to defer further action until after the Government scheme was submitted.

A despatch from Quebec announces that the Hon. Mr. Justice Caron, of the Court of Queen's Bench, was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of that Province, on Monday afternoon, at a salary, it is said, of \$12,000 a year, with a Judge's pension of \$4,000 a year after his five years' term of office has expired. The new Lieutenant-Governor will be sworn in a few days, on the receipt of his commission from Ottawa.

Sir Alexander Cockburn, the representative of England on the Geneva Board of Arbitrators has been rewarded for his services with the Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath. It is understood that he was offered a peerage but declined to accept it.

Ontario Legislature.

Mr. Rykert moved "That the continuance in office as a member of the Executive Council and as an adviser of His Excellency by a person who has voluntarily resigned his seat in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario is subversive of the first principles of responsible Government, and a most dangerous violation of the spirit of the constitution." A long discussion followed, when the debate was adjourned.

Hon. Mr. Crooks laid on the table a copy of the public accounts for 1872.

Mr. Clarke (Wellington) moved a second reading of Bill for the protection of insectivorous birds beneficial to agriculture.

Mr. Daceon moved an amendment striking out the provision of the bill which enacted that the gun or rifle of the person shooting these birds should be forfeited.

The amendment was lost on a division, and the Bill was after further amendment reported by the Committee.

Mr. Clarke (Wellington) moved the second reading of the Bill to provide for taking votes by ballot elections of members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario.

Mr. H. S. McDonald moved the six months' limit which was lost on voting for the second reading, and is against Mr. Clarke's motion that at no distant day the Government would bring forward a measure perhaps not the same in detail, but involving the same principle.

The New York Tribune says the collectors of South Wales, who brought some discredit on their cause by striking work without first exhausting all means of consultation, are likely to be reproached with an outrageous offense. A telegram published this morning announces that some of the writers have threatened with assassination the proprietors who purposed employing Chinese laborers. It is possible that these menaces originated with individual strikers. The society exercises over its men, render it extremely improbable that no such threats would have been employed except at the instigation of the societies. This incident is a strong evidence of the demoralizing effect of strikes on the laborer, and it will be fortunate when disputes between employers and employees can be satisfactorily arranged without resort to this expedient.

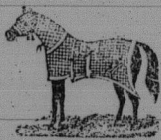
