Deaf and Dumb Instruction.

The Eighth Annual Convention of the instructors of the deaf and dumb, opened at Belleville on Wednesday, in the Ontario Institution for the deaf and dumb.

Delegates and visitors were present from different places in Canada and from almost every one of the United States, even so remote a portion of the Union as California being represented. The number present was bout one hundred and fifty, and the Convention was the largest yet held. A greater proportion than usual of the delegates were tratees of Institutions. A large proportion of the delegates were ladies, and quite a number of them was themselves deaf and dumb. The proceeding of the convention were interesting to visitors. One of the delegates, Rev. Dr. Gallandet, officiated as translator into the sign language, for the benefit of deaf members, of everything that was read, and it may be said that the extraordinary facility and rapidity with which it is possible to communicate, was very apparent. Not only did Dr. Gallandet translate all the remarks made as they were uttered at the speaker's usual rate of speed, but he kept up with the reading of the resolutions, and of the long list of names given when they were read in the report of the Committee on Credenials. That nothing might be lost to the deat members of the Convention, even the prayer which opened the proceedings was translated as it was delivered.
