JOHNSON HAS BEEN ALWAYS KNOWN AS A FIGHTER SINCE HIS FRESHMAN DAYS

Interesting Character Sketch of the Man Who Will Be Theodore Roosevelt's Running Mate at the Next Presidential Election

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 12.—Governor Hiram Johnson, of California, the Progressive party's nominee for vice-president, has been known as a fighter since his freshman days in the assembly of his state. In college he was an insurgent, and after leaving the university he entered public life as an insurgent. As a college student Hiram Johnson was noted for his athletic prowess. His determination to win when there was the slightest opportunity—often when the odds seemed hopelessly against him—was supported by the athletic constitution and a physical force of which his mates on the varsity were proud. But he did take an active part in the campaigns of his state. One of his first political achievements was the thwarting of the bill of the Southern Pacific machine, but he considered it inevitable.

George H. Clarke, mayor of Sacramento, had been defeated by the machine for the office of State Railway Commissioner, and in retaliation refused to appoint as chief of police a man named by the machine and the gangster. He was indicted to oust Clark from the office of mayor. Johnson, already popular as a criminal lawyer, was employed to defend Clark, and he was his case in one of the most bitter fights in the history of Western Coast politics.

In this case the young lawyer was mounted by a witness known as a ruffian. Every one predicted a rout for the defense. But when the trial came, the spectators thought the climax had come.

"Well we go now," inquired the witness.

London, Aug. 12.—Though England can do nothing short of declaring war to help the five British yachtsmen arrested at Eckernförde, charged with spying on Germany's coast defenses, the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, telegraphed today to the Berlin Embassy for full information concerning the case.

The English view is that the men were obviously perfectly harmless as tourists, and some newspapers urge retaliation upon German tourists in England.

Berlin, Aug. 12.—The arrest of five English yachtsmen at Eckernförde, a charge of espionage was due to the fact that a member of the party, an artist named Gregory Robinson, with one of his companions, while taking photographs ashore, happened to have a new torpedo range within field of his camera.

The arrest was effected by an armed Customs officer, who seems to have been dogging the yachtsmen since they unconsciously aroused the ire of the local officials by failing to report themselves at the Customs House immediately on their arrival in the bay.

As in the German sense of the term, they could not "legitimate" themselves, the police went aboard and arrested three of Mr. Robinson's companions, and ransacked the yacht. Of German views of scenery such as every holiday-maker takes are gravely described by the officials as "topographical records of the coast," and were said to include pictures of warships and of the Kiel Canal sluices.

German official ignorance of English amateur yachting customs invests the fact that the yacht bears no name or number and carries only its club burgee with grave significance. The fact also that these gentlemen, described as "distinguished appearance," should be sailing without a crew of paid hands strikes the Germans as most inexplicable and suspicious.

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SECURE RIFLE RANGE AS PARK SITE IS CITIZEN'S PLEA

William Pearce Writes Letter to Commissioners Urging City to Act Quickly

Emphasizes Department of Militia and Defense is Considering Another Site

Thinks City Should Secure at Least the Portion Between River and C. P. R. Canal

URGING that the city should take immediate steps to secure the present rifle range as a park site, William Pearce yesterday addressed a letter to the secretary of the City Planning Commission, who in turn handed it over to the commissioners. Mayor Mitchell and Commissioner Clarke, Commissioner Graves, expressed their interest in the idea. The matter probably will be put before Mr. R. E. Bennett, M. P., who is expected to return in a short time, inasmuch as Mr. Bennett also is looking into the question of an armory building for Calgary.

In his letter Mr. Pearce points out that the department of militia and defense is said to be considering the establishment of a rifle range elsewhere than at the present site, on sections 12, 24, 1 W. 5th, and 9, 24, 29, W. 4th, and that at least a portion of these sections should be secured by the city for park purposes. Mr. Pearce urges that all of them should be taken for a park if possible, but at least the portion lying between the Canadian Pacific Railway irrigation canal and the Bow river should be secured.

Gambler's Murder Laid to Revenge. San Francisco, Aug. 12.—The man shot from ambush last night in the Latin quarter was identified today as Giacomo Segestia, who the police say, was a Chicago gambler. He had lived in a tendor hotel for about four months.

The crime was one of revenge, for in the dead man's pockets were found a watch chain, \$100 in gold and a wallet full of papers, which seemed to have been stolen.

Police believe the murder might have been done by a rival in some love affair, by some one who followed Segestia here from Chicago.

Decoy Gambling House, Too? Mr. Whitman said today he had been informed that a police inspector had been paid \$500 a month to keep a gambling house. This is understood by Mr. Rockefeller's representative.

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Becker May Expose System. The possibility that the sealed doors of the past two weeks might be opened wide was strongly suggested tonight when it became known that counsel for Lieut. Becker, who is charged with the murder of Rosenthal, had visited the district attorney today and discussed with him the question of leniency of his client.

Not long after Becker was arrested, the district attorney made it known that the police lieutenant only chance to escape with his life was to confess to the murder in the first degree.

Under his willingness to tell all he knew about gambling graft, it was reported that Becker's lawyer made extensive suggestions of great interest.

Raiders Call City Wide Open. The district attorney had been the grand jury to select witnesses, one of them being Lieut. Dominick, one of the strong-arm squad members, who testified that the murder of Rosenthal was due to there was not a gambling house now in operation.

Another witness was Giovanni Stanich, a citizen who saw the murder.

Man Meeting Called. The formal call for a citizen's mass meeting at the city hall to discuss the need for a campaign to rid the city of gambling and other forms of lawlessness was issued tonight by the prominent men heretofore named as leading the movement, the sisters of the call include four women, Mrs. C. H. Mackay, Mrs. W. H. Baldwin, Mrs. C. R. Ieraci and Miss Maude R. Miner.

A memorandum accompanying the call says: "Protection of life and property is the basic duty of government. Recent developments show a decree of lawlessness that vitally threatens the community."

It is essential that every citizen of official bearing any information of value concerning present conditions should be encouraged to make these facts known in the confidence that he will be protected against terrorists and other crime.

Says He Was Sent to Becker. Harry Pollock, one of the witnesses before the grand jury today, is said to have told the jurymen that he was sent directly to Becker at police headquarters by Jack Rose to tell the lieutenant of Rose's hiding place.

Rose, in his confession declared that he assisted himself in the murder of Rosenthal. Pollock's partnership after the outcry over the murder of Rosenthal.

Reports were current tonight that some indictments for murder in connection with the case were likely to be reported soon by the grand jury.

CLAIM LITTLE GIRL WAS STARVED TO DEATH. London, Ont., Aug. 12.—At the instigation of the crown attorney at Sarnia, the police Saturday seized the body of a nine-year-old home girl, the funeral of which was taking place from the farmhouse of a man named Parks, one mile from Sarnia, where she had been placed.

From information in the hands of the attorney, the child had died as the direct result of sheer starvation and had not been given the slightest attention.

A jury was empaneled by Coroner Logie at Sarnia Saturday night and after viewing the remains adjourned until Wednesday next. Interesting developments are expected.

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER OBTAINING EVIDENCE IN POLICE GRAFT

Employed Private Detectives and Turned Evidence Over to District Attorney

Reported That He Financed a Gambling House to Demonstrate Graft

Mass of Evidence Said to be Accumulating Against New York Police

New York, Aug. 12.—The fact became known today that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has been instrumental in obtaining evidence of police graft, which he has turned over to District Attorney Whitman for use in connection with the investigation of alleged corruption among high police officials that has grown out of the murder of Herman Rosenthal.

While Starr J. Murphy, Mr. Rockefeller's attorney, denied today the published report that the willonate's son had been conducting a disorderly house for the purpose of obtaining evidence of blackmail against the police, he let it be known that Mr. Rockefeller, who about a year ago was foreman of the grand jury that investigated the white slave traffic, had placed in the hands of the district attorney information "bearing on the police situation."

Busy Obtaining Statistics. Mr. Rockefeller, having become interested in white slave traffic while foreman of the special grand jury, has since been securing statistics with regard to the social evil, reads Mr. Murphy's statement. "Whatever information was secured bearing on the police situation has been placed at the disposition of the district attorney. The statement that Mr. Rockefeller or his representatives have been conducting a disorderly house is entirely without foundation."

The information, it was learned tonight, will be presented to the grand jury in conjunction with the mass of similar evidence which the district attorney and his assistants have unearthed since "Bald Jack" Rose made his first charges involving high police officials in gambling graft.

CHIEF FEATURES OF ROOSEVELT'S SPEECH IN DECLARING PROGRESSIVE PLATFORM

We are advocating the correction for Socialism and the antidote for anarchy. The men who presided over the Baltimore and Chicago conventions and the great bosses who controlled the two conventions, Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Parker, Mr. Barnes and Mr. Murphy, Mr. Penrose and Mr. Taggart, Mr. Guggenheim and Mr. Sullivan, differ from one another, of course, on certain points. But these are the differences which one corporation lawyer has with another corporation lawyer. They are differences of degree, not of kind. We are standing against the brutality of the Democracy and the hypocrisy of the Republican party in setting a standard on the color question. We are stifling in advance conditions which have led to the crushing disaster and death of the great Republican party itself.

MEAT PRICES GOING UP

Cheaper in San Francisco Than in Sound Cities, Says Dealer

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—In an address before the Home Industry League today F. L. Washburn, of the Western Meat Company, predicted that the Pacific coast must soon pay more for its table meats.

"Prices here," he said, "are 30 per cent. cheaper than in Chicago for the choice cuts, and from 10 to 15 per cent. cheaper than in Seattle, Tacoma and Portland, but it won't last. The retailer here has cut his profits to the lowest possible point in the effort to meet before-the-fire prices."

"This is the explanation of the purely local difference up and down the Coast."

AMERICAN GUARDS PACIFY NICARAGUA

Situation Considerably Cleared—Diaz Refuses Demand That He Resign Presidency

Managua, Nicaragua, Aug. 11.—Since the arrival of the guard for the American legation at Managua, the situation has remained peaceful, and the apprehension of foreign residents has been relieved.

On Monday the insurgents cut the railroad north, for a time causing a complete suspension of service.

The government is concentrating forces, south of Granada, at Managua and north of Leon. General Menz has displayed little activity. A committee of five came to Managua yesterday bearing a proposal from General Menz that President Diaz resign; that General Chamarra, the Nicaraguan commander in chief, and himself withdraw their menaces, and that the assembly elect a new president from the list of five Menzistas and Zelayistas named by himself. This offer was declined.

Robbed Trains Formerly
