reasons H.R.H. had been forced to leave Canada at the present time.

"The more we know of each other, the better it will be for both nations," Mr. Borden said in proposing the toast "Our Guests" and in welcoming the bankers to the capital. "We are met here to celebrate the 100 years of peace and although we have had our differences, public men in the United States and Canada have been true to the public trust invested in them, and we thank God for it. We have shown the world a boundary line of 4,000 miles unguarded and that surely is something worth showing."

"The glory of the ditizenship of Canada and the United States," declared Hon, Cornelius A. Pugsley, "is that true bravery and devotion to duty are to be found, not alone on the battle field, but everywhere that men and women have tasks to perform.

War and Passion Perished."

"Some vvictories of peace," was the keynote of the address of J. J. Hill, the noted American magnate, in responding to the toasts, "Our Guests."

Mr. Hill said in part:

"One hundred years ago, what was probably the last war ever to occur between English-speaking people was drawing to a close. It was most bitterly contested along the northern boundary line of the United States. The population of the country in 1810 was almost exactly equal to that of Canada at the present time. The revenue of the United States during that war rose to more than \$10,000,000 per annum. There was no Dominion of Canada in those days, only a few provinces that had been the scene and the pray of so many of the European wars of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Not yet, to use the immortal phrase of a great English states. man, had a new world been called into existence to redress the balance of the old."


