DEWET AND STEYN.

London, Feb. 26.-A correspondent that several cases still under treatof the Daily Telegraph at De Aar locates Gen. Dewet and Mr. Steyn at Petrusville. He praises the admirable work of Captain Norman Naton, a Canadian engineer, in protecting a large stretch of railway.

London, Feb. 26 .- A correspondent at Johannesburg, detailing Gen. Methuen's march to Klerksdorp, says that he had a series of fights. He cleared every town through which he passed of provisions and forage, and took the women and children to Clerksdorp. He captured 6,000 rounds of ammunition, 1,300 head of cattle and 1,000 sheep,

and destroyed 1,600 bags of grain. It is reported that the influential Commandant General Botha, with 2,000 hundred Boers in the Dewetsdorp district, are willing to surrender if the commandant shall receive a proposition direct from Gen. Kitchener.

CONDUCT OF THE WAR. London, Feb. 26.—The war secretary, Mr. Brodrick, discussing in the House of Commons a motion to publish proceedings of courts of inquiry, said it was still the purpose of the government to make a general inquiry into the conduct of the war in South Africa, when the war was substantially ended. Nobody could say the war was substantially ended while 200,000 men were engaged in the military operations. The government, in the meanwhile, had investigated twenty painful incidents of surrenders of British incidents of surrenders of British troops. A large number of officers had been made accountable and ten had been dismissed. No officer returning frem South Africa would be employed at home without Lord Roberts' and Gen. Gen. Kitchener's recommendation. Scarcely a week passed without an officer being removed or otherwise pun-

ished. IS "GAT" DEAD? Ottawa, Feb. 26 .- The department of militia has not yet received any word regarding Major "Gat" Howard, who was in command of the Canadian Scouts in South Africa, and who is re-ported to have been killed.

BADEN-POWELL'S MEN. Mortimer Wigle, of Kingsville, Ont., who served with the Canadian Mounted Rifles, is anxious to return to South Africa with the Baden-Powell constabulary, and has resigned his commission in the Kinksville cavalry. The first draft of British Columbia recruits for Baden-Powell's South African police have left for Ottawa. They

numbered 31 men, nearly all members of the Third Battalion, Royal Canadian Special Service Regiment, which has been stationed at Esquimalt, and is now being disbanded. BLIZZARD RENEWED AT ODESSA

All Traffic Suspended and Many Deaths From Freezing.

Six Students Shot for Refusing to Re-

Odessa, Feb. 26.-The blizzard was renewed Saturday night, and Sunday the temperature was 6 degrees below zero, centrigrade. All traffic in the streets is suspended. The storm came on so suddenly and severely that street cars and other vehicles were snowed in on the public thoroughfare. police were obliged to interfere. Many people were unable to leave the theater until 3 o'clock in the morning. The wind was so strong that to welcome King Edward, who has been omnibuses were overturned and im- a frequent visitor there, but abandoned mense drifts of snow were piled up, which it is impossible to cope with. The shipping in the harbor has already suffered considerable damage the anchor chains of many vessels breaking. The steamer Simeus went on the rocks and sank. Most of the telegraph and telephone wires are down. Railway traffic has ceased as far as Zatchistwan, and cannot be resumed for some days. A large number of people have been frozen to death in the outskirts of Odessa.

FATAL FIRES. London, Feb. 26.-A fire in a residence situated in the poor quarter of Birmingham resulted in six men and women being incinerated and four persons being dangerously burned. Catania, Sicily, Feb. 26.-The Castagnota Theater was destroyed by fire Sunday night. Two persons were killed and many were wounded.

THE KING'S OATH Cardinal Vaughan's pastoral to the Catholic churches, deploring the language of the oath taken by the King upon his accession, says: "Alone among the parliaments of the world the English legislature compels the sovereign to declare that the religion of three out of four members of the Christian world is superstitious and idolatrous." It urges Catholics at home and abroad to take such constitutional steps as will lead to the repeal of the objectional part of the oath. The cardinal has written to the King on the subject.

It is reported that six ringleaders have been shot for refusing to renew their oath of allegiance to the ezar. Since Jan. 1, some 85 students have been sent to Siberia. DEROULEDE.

Paris, Feb. 26.-Saturday was the anniversary of the attempt at a coup d'etat by M. Paul Deroulede and Marcel-Habert, at the Neuilly barracks, on the occasion of the funeral of M. Faure, and also the anniversary of the sentence to five years' banishment imposed a year later by the French Senate, sitting as the high court, upon M. Marcel-Habert. Many of their sympathizers went to San Sebastian, where the two exiles are residing, to pay their respects. M. Deroulede de-

livered a long address. WORLD'S MERCHANT MARINE.

London, Feb. 26 .- The World's Merchant marine has increased 226 per cent in 26 years. Great Britain now owns more than half of all the steamers in the world, while Germany owns nearly twice as many as the United States, although the latter includes the lake marine in the estimates. The gross tonnage of Britain is 14,362,000, Germany 2,720,000, and the United
