## GEN. METHUEN'S CLEAN SWEEP!

He Cleared Every Boer Town Through Which He Passed,

Taking All the Provisions and Forage and Removing the Women and Children--Steyn and Dewet on the Run--Botha Said to Have Escaped.

DEWET AND STEYN.

London, Feb. 26.-A correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at De Aar locates Gen. Dewet and Mr. Steyn at Petrusville. He praises the admirable work of Captain Norman Naton, a Canadian engineer, in protecting a large stretch of railway.

London, Feb. 26.-A correspondent at Johannesburg, detailing Gen. Methuen's march to Klerksdorp, says that he had a series of fights. He cleared every town through which he passed of provisions and forage, and took the women and children to Klerksdorp. He captured 6,000 rounds of ammunition, 1,300 head of cattle and 1,000 sheep, and destroyed 1,600 bags of grain.

It is reported that the influential Commandant General Botha, with 2,000 Boers in the Dewetsdorp district, are willing to surrender if the commandant shall receive a proposition direct from Gen. Kitchener.

HOW ABOUT BOTHA?

A Cape Town dispatch of today's date, says: "It is reported here that Commandant General Botha, with 2,000 Boers has broken away from Gen. French's pursuit, in the direction of Kooatpoort."

The Boers are attacking the village of Richmond in the central part of Cape Colony, and reinforcements have been dispatched from Hanover road.

DEWET AND STEYN.

A De Aar, Cape Colony, dispatch, dated Feb. 25, says: Gen. Dewet, accompanied by Mr. Steyn, recrossed the Orange River station yesterday. The Orange River rose five feet last night. A heavy rain is still falling, and it is believed to be impossible for the Boers to cross the stream. They are being closely followed by Col. Thorneycroft, who left here yesterday by rail. Several other columns are converging on Gen. Dewet.

### BUBONIC PLAGUE IN CAPE TOWN

Cape Town, Feb. 26.-Thus far 31 cases of bubonic plague have been reported in Cape Town, including 29 Europeans. There have been six deaths.

The consul, who is accused of tyrannically opposing the wishes of his daughter, is reported to have become tired of the struggle and has resolved to resign his post and take his daughter home.

MGR. FALCONIO.

It is understood that Archbishop Martinelli, papal delegate in the United States, after his arrival at St. Peterburg, will remain for some time papal delegate in the United States, and later will be replaced by Monsignor Falconio, the papal delegate in Canada.

SIX STUDENTS SHOT.

Moscow advices are to the effect that the government has empowered the rectors of the universities of Moscow, St. Petersburg, Kiev and Odessa to call upon the military at a moment's notice to quell revolutionary outbreaks. It is reported that six ringleaders have been shot for refusing to renew their oath of allegiance to the czar. Since Jan. 1, some 35 students have been sent to Siberia.

DEROULEDE.

Paris, Feb. 26.-Saturday was the anniversary of the attempt at a coup d'etat by M. Paul Derooude and Marcel Habert, at the Neuilly barracks, on the occasion of the arrest of M. Faure, and also the anniversary of the sentence to five years' banishment imposed a year later by the French Senate, sitting as the high court, upon M. Marcel-Habert. Many of their sympathizers went to St. Sebastien, where the two exiles are residing, to pay their respects. M. Derooude delivered a long address.

### WORLD'S MERCHANT MARINE.

London, Feb. 26.-The World's Merchant marine has increased 226 per cent in 26 years. Great Britain now owns more than half of all the steamers in the world, while Germany owns nearly twice as many as the United States, although the latter includes the lake marine in the estimates. The gross tonnage of Britain is 14,382,000, Germany, 2,720,000, and the United States 2,543,000.

### CABLE NOTES.

The Spanish trade in boots and shoes with the Philippines and Cuba is beginning to suffer from American competition.

Distress in Italy is increasing among the working classes, and the threatened disturbances the government is supplying food.

France's short supply of coal is being so much shortened by strikes, and the prohibitive prices of American coal imports of American coal seem necessary.

The British admiralty will send the third-class cruiser Calypso to the Newfoundland coast to train fishermen for the naval reserve.

A Rome dispatch says: The report that Archbishop Martinelli, apostolic delegate to the United States, will be created a cardinal, is confirmed.

El Liberal of Madrid publishes a dispatch from Oporto, Portugal, saying that a crowd stoned the office of the Palabra, a Catholic journal of that city, because of a report that the editor had attempted to carry away the daughter of the Brazilian consul. The police were obliged to interfere. The homes of the religious congregations in Oporto are now guarded by police.

The people of Hamburg had planned to welcome King Edward, who has been a frequent visitor there, but abandoned their intention in deference to his wish that his visit shall be strictly private.

### SUIT FOR \$5,000 DAMAGES

Ottawa, Feb. 25.-Emery Gauvreau, Water street, has issued a writ for \$5,000 damages, alleging that an unauthorized autopsy was performed upon the body of his son, who died in Water street Hospital a few days ago. The son died of a fever after a large After the funeral it was said an autopsy had been performed.

Mr. Gauvreau visited the cemetery and found that the body had been opened and the entire viscera removed. He asked the hospital authorities for an explanation, and has entered suit claiming \$5,000 damages.

### HAMILTON GETS SEVEN YEARS.

Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 26.-Frank H. Hamilton, the reporter, convicted of manslaughter in the first degree, was today sentenced to seven years at hard labor in the state prison at Stillwater for the killing of Leonard Day last November.

Syracuse, N. Y., Feb. 25.-The trial of Ernest Hecht for the murder of Mrs. Louise Foster, on May 24, 1900, opened here yesterday. The woman was found dead with the accused sitting beside her body and a loaded revolver near by. She had a few drops of chloroform and morphine. Hecht made a confession to the police, stating that they had been in love and had agreed to die together. The woman fulfilled her part, assisted by him, and he tried to summon courage to kill himself, but his nerve failed. At the time of confession he was anxious to die. Today he is as anxious to live. His attorney will make a hard fight, alleging insanity, hypnotism, etc.

Herr Eueb, a member of the German Reichstag, has been sentenced to serve three months in jail on the charge of lese majeste.
