WESTERN ONTARIO.

Wholesale Smuggling Suspected at Sarnia.

Death of a Prominent Guelphite—Conscience Money Returned at Windsor—Amherstburg Aldermen in Court.

BRANT.
The will of the late Wm. Slingsby, of Brantford, has been entered for probate. The estate is valued at \$13,362.43, including \$12,102.43 personally, of which \$9,920 is in bank and \$2,182.43 in real estate. Mrs. Slingsby is to have \$400 a year for life, and at her death the estate is to be divided into nine equal parts, of which the sons are each to receive two and the daughters one.

ESSEX.
The appointment of W. A. McIntosh, Division Court clerk in the ninth district, Essex, has been gazetted. Collector of Customs Martin, of Windsor, has received \$125, marked conscience money. Some opium had been smuggled and repented.

The Grand Trunk Road assessment in Walkerville amounts to \$9.66 a foot, while adjacent property is taxed at \$40 a foot. Assessor McNeil will raise the railroad property to the latter figure.

The Walkerville council have given the electric road 30 days in which to fulfill their agreement, and if it is not done in that time the agreement will be withdrawn. As a result of the quo warranto proceeding started in Walkerville some weeks ago against Ald. Bark, Assessors Elliot and Smith have been summoned to appear before Magistrate McGee and answer the charge of making a fraudulent assessment in which Bark is interested.

HURON.
The Presbytery of Maitland met at Wingham May 9. Rev. W. H. Geisler, moderator, Rev. J. McNabb, clerk. Rev. Dr. Anderson, of Glasgow, Scotland, was invited to sit as corresponding member. It was agreed that six ordinary meetings of the Presbytery shall be held during the year, viz., the third Tuesday in January, March, May, July, September and November. The clerk was instructed to notify the Presbytery of Huron that this Presbytery is open to confer with them in re-union of Duncannon and Port Albert with Leith.

The resignation of Rev. A. F. McLean, of Huron congregation, was accepted, and a resolution expressing high appreciation of his services was adopted. The resignation will take effect May 15. Mr. McLean was appointed moderator of the session and instructed to declare the charge vacant on May 21. It was agreed to make application to the General Assembly to have Mr. McLean's name placed on the list of candidates on the aged and infirm ministers' fund.

The resignation of Rev. A. Stevenson, of the charge of Moleworth congregation was accepted, to take effect May 29. A minute expressing the Presbytery's esteem for Mr. Stevenson and appreciation of his excellent qualities was adopted. Mr. McRae was appointed interim moderator of the session of Moleworth congregation. Mr. McRae was also appointed to declare the charge vacant on June 4. Rev. Mr. Anderson, of St. Helen's, obtained leave of absence for three months. Mr. R. N. Thurler, of Teeswater, was appointed commissioner to the General Assembly, also Rev. J. Rose in place of Rev. J. McFarlane, resigned. A resolution in memorial of the late Rev. Alexander Grant was adopted and a copy of it sent to the widow. The clerk reported that Mr. E. A. Macdonald, student, is suffering from lung disease. Congregation. Mr. K. Macdonald, B.A., B.D., a graduate of Montreal Presbyterian College, delivered trials for license, which were sustained as very satisfactory, and he was licensed to preach the Gospel. An adjourned meeting will be held Tuesday, May 20, at 7 p.m. in the Presbyterian Church, Wingham.

The yacht Norma is being fitted up by its owner, E. N. Lewis, at Goderich, to visit, in company with some loving friends, the World's Fair at Chicago.

LAMBTON.
A Sarnia dispatch says: Sarnia customs authorities are after the smugglers. Special Customs Officer McCleary, of Toronto, is working among the smugglers at Sarnia. The authorities are of opinion that there has been a good deal of smuggling going on between Sarnia and Port Huron for a while back, and it is understood that the authorities are making it warm for some of the leading merchants and bankers in town. It is understood that a prominent manager of a loan company was taxed \$100 for goods worth about \$35; also a druggist was taxed for a similar amount.

The first boat of the Sarnia Line to leave this season will be the Monarch, which is advertised to sail on May 16.

Rev. Mr. Waltham has been appointed by Rev. Dean Jones as resident minister at Sarnia. The services are changed, Moorestown and Cornwall have morning and afternoon services alternately, and Court-right every evening. The reverend gentleman will reside in Court-right in a house kindly provided by Mr. Featherstone free of rent.

Norman Mackenzie, son of Judge Mackenzie, has been appointed town solicitor for Regina, N. W. T.

Judge Mackenzie, of Sarnia, continues to develop his territory on Mrs. Menzie's land, Osborne township, and is meeting with good success.

The many friends of Mrs. James Muir, proprietor of the hotel of that name at the St. Clair Hotel, who with her husband was for many years in charge of the Canadian Club House, will be pained to learn of her untimely death, which occurred on Tuesday at the hotel. She was stricken with pneumonia.

In consequence of a disagreement with Mayor McKechnie, Chief of Police Chegwinn, of Dundas, has sent in his resignation.

WELLINGTON.
The death of George Elliott, formerly a merchant of Guelph, is recorded. The deceased died at the Arlington Hotel, Washington, D. C., where he had spent the winter. He had occupied the positions of mayor of Guelph, warden of the county, and president of the Reform Association.

The large frame barn of Wm. Flewelling, con. 11 of the township of Peel, was destroyed by fire on May 10. One valuable young horse, three calves and three pigs were burned; also a binder, mower, wagon, cutter, etc., seed grain and a large quantity of hay. Loss about \$1,200; partially covered by insurance.

Visits of the H. C. R. to Oxford Courts—Officers Installed.

The high chief ranger of the Canadian Order of Foresters paid courts East Zorra and Exeter, located an Innerkip, an official visit on the 5th inst. The purpose of the visit was to assist in the amalgamation of these two courts. Bro. Edward Towe, H. C. R., London, occupied the chair, and appointed Bros. The Deadbeats' Chance.
"I'm just willing to bet all I make on the next trip that that judgment at Osprey Hall will cause us trouble," said a railway conductor. He was referring to the Court of Appeal's judgment in the case of Beaver vs. the Grand Trunk Railway, wherein the court decided that a conductor for the court to put a passenger on a train for failure to show his ticket. "That decision opens up great possibilities for the deadbeat, who has nerve, and few there are who have not. The way the case stands now a man can travel all over the country without paying a fare, and a whole lot of deadbeats might prefer to show tickets, but the company would have to carry them wherever they wished to go, with no guarantee that anyone had paid his way. If a deadbeat were put off a train he easily get a couple of his pals to say that he saw him purchase a ticket, and the railway company could be caught for damage."

Faults vs. London Mutual.
WARDVILLE, May 10.—The long-pending suit between T. A. Faults, of Wardville, and the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company, has at last been settled satisfactorily to the plaintiff, who received \$850 and all costs of the action. The plaintiff also received a statement that all charges of fraud or misconduct against him are withdrawn. Following is the agreement:

Chancery Division, Faults vs. London Mutual.—It is agreed between the parties: (1) That judgment be entered for the plaintiff for \$850 and all costs of the action. (2) That all charges of fraud or misconduct on the part of the plaintiff be withdrawn. (3) That on payment of the damages and costs, the plaintiff shall give to the defendants and their officers a general release of all claims and demands, if required, and all such prepared at their expense, and all such claims and demands shall be satisfied by such payment, May 6, 1931.
