Hon, G. W. Ross' Farewell

To the West Middlesex Liberal Association:

Gentlemen,-Owing to my appointment to the Senate of Canada, my place in the Legislative Assembly of Ontario as your representative becomes vacant. I deeply regret that I am unable to continue the full term to which you elected me two years ago, and were it not for the disability to serve you to the full measure of the strength of former years, no consideration on my part would have moved me to accept the appointment which severs our relations.

You have honored me as few men in Canada have been honored. It is now nearly 35 years since I was first chosen as your representative. Again and again, through eleven different elections you have repeated that early expression of confidence and good will, and although my course may have called for much forbearance on your part, you never wavered in your loyalty and devotion to the candidate of your choice. Under these circumstances and with the recollections which they naturally recall, you will in some measure understand my feelings in severing my connection with you. There is scarcely a home in West Middlesex which at one time or another I have not entered, and in which, irrespective of political differences, I have not been kindly received. And although many of those to whom I owed so much and who were most active in my early campaigns have passed away, I have found their successors equally devoted to myself and to the principles I represent.

My career as your representative has not been one of leisure or repose. Although I may not have accomplished all that you had a right to expect, and left undone some "'ng which might have been fairly expected of me, kindly assume that it has been owing to the limitation of human effort rather than to indifference on my part.
