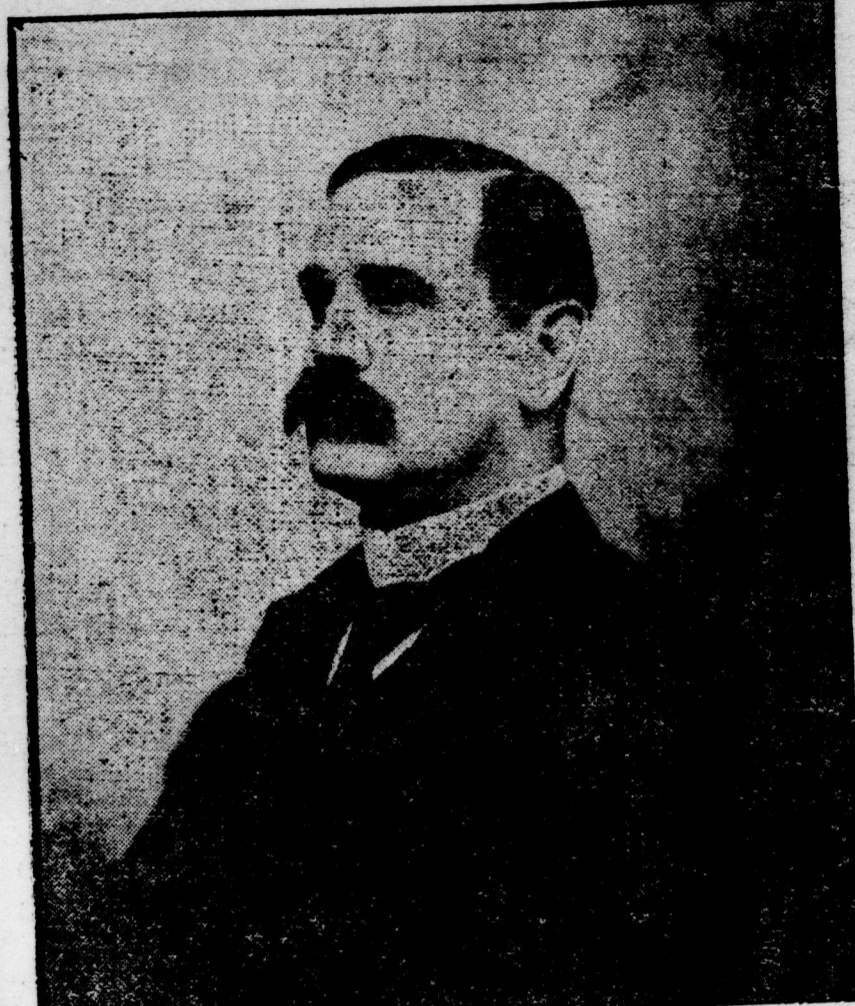


HYMAN THE UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF LIBERALS FOR BY-ELECTION

Minister of Public Works Nominated at One of the Largest and Most Enthusiastic Political Conventions in the History of London.

Mr. Hyman Consents To Be the Candidate—Mention of His Name the Signal for a Demonstration—Stirring Speeches.

Charles S. Hyman is again the Liberal candidate in London. At one of the largest and most enthusiastic nominating conventions ever assembled in London, he was last night unanimously chosen as the party's standard-bearer.

M'Clary Company Will Not Make Use of Niagara Power

Decides to Install Producer Gas Engine, Which is Very Much Cheaper. Power at from \$12 to \$14 a horsepower per annum is what the M'Clary Manufacturing Company has decided it can secure from producer gas engines.

Col. Gartshore, manager of the company, states that after a most thorough investigation he is convinced that this is the cheapest power the company can secure from any source, and as a result tenders have been asked from American firms to supply the engine and boilers.

REAL WAR ON IN CENTRAL AMERICA

Nicaraguans Defeat Forces of Honduras and Are Marching on the Capital. Paris, Feb. 22.—The Nicaragua Legislature today furnished this dispatch for publication: "Managua, Nicaragua, Feb. 21.—Honduras, having violated the treaty of Corinto and renewed her provocations, hostilities were resumed Monday. The Nicaraguan troops triumphed and are now marching upon Leguapala."

ENGINEER SEVERELY HURT

REDS MAKE ANOTHER HAUL

Kill Six in a Warsaw Postoffice and Loot the Safe. Warsaw, Russian Poland, Feb. 22.—The postoffice at Wapolna street was attacked at noon today by a band of Terrorists, who shot and killed the postmaster, two postal clerks and two soldiers guarding the office, and wounded a score of bystanders. The Terrorists robbed the safe of the cash and stamps and escaped in cabs.

NEWFOUNDLAND PROTESTS

Sends an Address to Elgin Protesting Against Modus Vivendi. Halifax, N. S., Feb. 22.—The Legislative Council, the upper house of the Newfoundland Legislature, has adopted by a vote of 11 to 2 an address to Lord Elgin, British secretary of state for the colonies, protesting against the modus vivendi arranged last October between the British and American Governments for the regulation of the herring fishery on the west coast of the island. The lower house adopted the same address last week by a vote of 23 to 3. The address, which will be presented to the Government tomorrow, sets forth that the modus vivendi was agreed upon by the two governments without the British officials consulting the Newfoundland Government or endeavoring to learn the views of the residents of the colony.
