HYMAN THE UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF LIBERALS FOR BY-ELECTION

Linister of Public Works Nominated at One of the Largest and Most Euthusiastic Political Conventions in the History of London.

Mr. Hyman Consents To Be the Candidate-Mention of His Name the Signal for a Demonstration-Stirring Speeches.

Charles S. Hyman is again the Liberal candidate in London. At one of the largest and most enthusiastic nominating conventions ever assembled in London, he was last night unanimously chosen as the party:

Mr. Hyman has already accepted, because, before the meeting, he wired to Mr. George C. Gibbons, K. C., president of the London Liberal Associa-

tion, as follows: "I place myself in the hands of my London and Ottawa friends." Hyman Hall was packed to the doors.

Representative Liberals from all parts of the city were present. Some of them could look back upon half a century of political history in London Others were young men who have not as yet cast their first vote. But all of them were Hyman men, full of enthusiasm and vigor, and ready for fight. There was no mistaking the tone of the meeting. The turnout showed that the Liberals of London are behind Hyman to a man, and that they intend to place him at the head of the polls against any candidate whom the Conservatives may name to oppose him.


