JOY RIDERS STEAL CAR; WRECKED; 2 WILL DIE

Pittsburg, Pa., July 4.—While Col. H. P. Bove, vice-president of the Carnegie Steel Company, was attending the ball game this afternoon three men jumped into his automobile, which was parked across from Forbes field, and started for a joy ride. They crossed the river to the north side, where two motorcycle policemen raced after them.

The high speed car was fast leaving the police behind, when it crashed into a pile of smokestacks in the street. The car turned turtle, and the three men were dragged from beneath the car and hurled to a hospital.

John Miller, 24 years old, has a fractured skull, and A. G. Lucas has an injured spine. Both will die. Charles Hays, aged 2, is seriously cut and bruised, but will recover. The machine was wrecked.

CITY ENGINEER HAS RESIGNED

Resignation Was Presented to the Council and Sent to Committee of the Whole.

NO HURRY TO ACCEPT IT

Vote Stood a Tie, But Was Broken by His Worship—The Discussion Last Night

City Engineer Graydon tendered his resignation to the council last night. Until 7:30 he hesitated about the matter, but just before the meeting he handed it in. The communication was referred to a committee of the whole council to meet on Monday night next to discuss the matter.

The letter was as follows:

"To the Mayor and Aldermen, City of London:—During the past two years my health has not been as vigorous as in former years, and my duties and responsibilities have greatly increased by reason of the increased population and area of the city. This, combined with the knowledge that there is a desire on the part of a certain number of citizens to have a chief engineer appointed, makes me consider this is an opportune time for me to tender you my resignation as city engineer, to be accepted at your pleasure.

"I desire, Mr. Mayor, to thank you and every alderman of the city council individually in the most heartfelt manner for the kindness, consideration, and co-operation which you have extended to me during the present year, and to express the regret I will feel when I sever my connection with this office.

"I have the honor to be, your obedient servant,

City Engineer."

Take Your Time.

Ald. Tancock moved that the communication be referred to a committee of the whole.

"We should not deal with this matter on the spur of the moment," he said. "It is most important to the city, and we should have time to think it over. The resignation should be given due consideration."

"If he wishes to resign, why not accept it?" asked Ald. Morgan. "Is it a feeling? What are we to do when it comes in but accept it? Is it sincere?" Mayor Beattie refused to answer Ald. Morgan's question as to Mr. Graydon's sincerity.

Ald. Saunders seconded Ald. Tancock's motion, and the resignation was referred to a committee of the whole.

CHIEF JUSTICE FULLER DIES SUDDENLY

Was Head of U. S. Supreme Court and Noted as Orator and Scholar.

Bar Harbor, Maine, July 4.—Chief Justice Fuller of the supreme court of the United States died today.

Melville Weston Fuller was born in Augusta, Maine, Feb. 11, 1833. He was appointed chief justice of the United States April 30, 1888.

Judge Fuller's father was Frederick A. Fuller, and there is a coincidence in the fact that his mother was the daughter of Chief Justice Nathan Webster. Young Fuller attended school at Augusta, and was graduated from Bowdoin College in the class of 1853.

He was a classmate of Edward J. Phelps, who was subsequently to become a distinguished lawyer, and United States minister to England. It is a curious fact that 35 years later President Cleveland seriously debated the question whether he should appoint Fuller or Phelps to the chief justiceship.

After Mr. Fuller's admission to the bar, in 1856, he remained in Augusta only two or three years. While there, however, he was a member of the city council, and during a part of the time city attorney. Then he went to Chicago and became within a short time a leader at the local bar.

Opposed to Slavery. Although identified with the Democratic party during the war, Mr. Fuller was not in sympathy with that wing of the democracy which supported the course taken by the south. He was an intimate personal friend of Stephen A. Douglas, and one of the most notable of his speeches was made to welcome Mr. Douglas at the great reception given in his honor by Chicago citizens in 1860.

When Mr. Fuller was appointed to the highest judicial position in the nation, the subject of his partisanship was naturally talked about. A Democratic president was in office, and he was expected to appoint a Demo-

crat. The examination of Mr. Fuller's political record at the time of his appointment by President Cleveland disclosed nothing but that which was creditable. The old-fashioned idea that judges ought not to be too "partisan" was practically vindicated in his case, for, although a partisan, he had represented the highest and best type of moderate, conservative partisanship.

One of the remarkable things about Chief Justice Fuller was the wide extent of his general knowledge. It has been said that no case was ever presented to him without calling out the fact at some stage of the proceedings that he had a previously-acquired knowledge of the general subject involved in the case in hand. In one celebrated case he surprised many persons with his knowledge—evidently not acquired merely for the occasion—of ecclesiastical law. It was during the trial of Bishop Cheney of the Reformed Episcopal Church, on charges of heresy, S. Corning Judd, another noted lawyer of the Chicago bar, conducted the prosecution against Bishop Cheney, and Mr. Fuller defended him. The case served to bring out the wonderful scholarship of Mr. Fuller and his ability to make the most of the evidence in hand to prove his case.

Loved Outdoor Life. Chief Justice Fuller lived in Washington in a manner to uphold the best traditions of the high office that he occupied. He spent much time in work and study, yet found time to move among his fellow-men in a social way. He was not a clubman in the accepted sense of that word, but he was occasionally seen both at the Metropolitan Club and at the Chevy Chase Club. He was particularly fond of outdoor life, and spent as much time as possible in the open air. At his

summer home near Bar Harbor, Me., he devoted much of his time to study. He delighted to entertain visitors there in a quiet, unostentatious way.

Chief Justice Fuller was twice married. His first wife was Calista E. Reynolds. In 1868 he married the daughter of the late William F. Coolbaugh, a Chicago banker of distinction. Chief Justice Fuller had eight daughters, all of whom have married. Miss Frances Louise Fuller, the only child of his second marriage, was married in 1906 to Dr. Robert French Mason, of Washington, D. C.

Chief Justice Fuller was a man of short stature and spare of limb. Probably the most noticeable feature in his appearance was his snow-white hair, which was allowed to fall almost to his shoulders.

A NEW WAY TO SECURE A GRANT

Ald. Tancock Shows How the River May Be Dredged This Year.

PAY FOR USE OF BOATS

Ald. Tancock Says the City Has to Depend on the Boat Club When Search for Boats Is Made.

There are some ways of circumventing city bylaws, but Ald. Tancock started an original method last evening at the council meeting. Whether or not it will be successful depends on the action of the city fathers at their next meeting.

In the report of the board of works a recommendation was made that the council make a grant of \$200 towards the boat club for dredging the river.

Ald. Richter objected, saying the council had no power. He asked for the ruling of the chair.

Alleges False Pretences.

"Ald. Richter had the \$1,000 granted for this work cut out of the estimates by false pretences," declared Ald. Morgan. When he asked us to remove it he promised to support such a recommendation as we have brought in tonight. He makes a promise, and then he goes back on it. There is always something back of his promises."

"I ask your ruling, your worship," said Ald. Richter in his mildest tone. "In view of the city solicitor's opinion, I must not do that. I have no power," declared his worship.

"It would pay the city to spend thousands of dollars on the river whether we have power or not," shot back Ald. Saunders.

The latter then moved that City Solicitor Meredith's opinion be obtained on the legality of the motion. Ald. Jeffries seconded it.

A Surprise. When the order of motions came up Ald. Tancock sprang his surprise.

"I move that the Thames Boat Club be given a grant of \$200 for the use of the boats of their fleet, grunting, ironing, etc., in assisting the search for the body of a citizen of London who was drowned in the river on Sunday," declared Ald. Tancock. "It appears that we are quite dependent upon the boat club at such times."

Ald. Pocock seconded the motion. "That is new business, and must come under the head of notices of motion," shot back Ald. Richter. "I ask for a ruling."

"It must stand as a notice of motion," ruled the mayor.

"Well, let it stand at that," retorted Ald. Tancock.

It will be dealt with at the next regular meeting of the council.
