## FIRE STRICKEN IN BAD PLIGHT

Great Blaze at Bangor, Maine, Leaves Thousands Homeless and Hungry.

LOSSES REACH MILLIONS

Populace Helpless Against Flame

(Cnadian Press.)

Bangor, Maine, May 1.-Homeless ungry and exhausted by the long fight against the flames which had de stroyed a third of the city of Bangor last night, thousands of persons who protected only by a meagre supply of providing themselves with food, shelter and clothing, while city and state authorities are considering plans for
