PARKS BOARD ARE READY TO PROVIDE FOR LOAN

Interest and Sinking Fund For Debentures Would Come Out of Half Mill on Rate.

Members of the parks commission of London explain that in asking the city council to authorize an issue of \$15,000 debentures to cover permanent improve-ments to the parks of the city, they were simply acting in the same manner as a simply acting in the same manner as a business man who would borrow money for the purpose of erecting a factory to cover his needs, instead of building an addition from year to year.

It is the intention to provide for the sinking fund and interest out of the half mill allotted each year for the maintenance of the parks, and it was thought better and more businesslike to go straight ahead with what work is needed instead of doing the jobs piecemeal from year to year, which would prove more costly and less satisfactory all round.
