### EGGLESS RECIPES

When the price of eggs soar so high as to make their use almost prohibited, the wise housekeeper turns to her recipe: that call for no eggs at all. It is possible to make delicious corn bread and muffins chocolate puddings and even cakes and

ookies without eggs. Some cooks offer rolled crackers as substitute for eggs, and, in many food combinations, they succeed admirably. In frying oysters, when eggs are high-priced, the oysters will be found most acceptable if rolled in corn-meal before frying, or dipped in corn-starch moistened milk to the consistency of batter.

Nut Biscuit.

2 cups of flour, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, neaping teaspoon of baking powder, large tablespoon of butter, 1 cup of chopped nuts, 4 tablespoons of sugar, milk make soft dough. Sift the flour, sait and baking powder together. Rub in the shortening and the nuts, chopped very line. Add the sugar and enough milk to make a biscuit dough. Shape with the hands into small balls, place well apart on greased pans, brush tops with milk, sprinkle some of the chopped nuts on top

nd bake in a hot oven. The tops may be covered with sugar and water icing if desired when baked, or they may be split and jelly put between the halves. They are also deliious just served hot with butter.

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
