EDMONTON TO HAVE A NEW STATION

Description of the Depot Now Being Erected by Canadian Pacific Railway.

One of the smaller works of construction which the C. P. R. is carrying out in the West is a new station at Edmonton, which is compulsory owing to the rapid growth of the city. The new station will have entrance both on Jasper avenue and Ninth street, but the main entrance will be on the latter thoroughfare, where a large carriage space has been provided. The tracks are elevated over Jasper avenue, and here a stairway entrance, which leads to the concourse, has been provided. At this point there is a turnstile exit from the tracks. The main entrance is provided with ample space for the posing and standing vehicles, with a sidewalk for foot passengers fourteen feet wide. The entrance from Ninth street into the main building opens directly into the main waiting room, which is fifty feet square, and on one side have been conveniently placed the elaborate ticket offices. Leading from the main waiting-room is a corridor thirty-four feet long, at the end of which is arranged the baggage room, with large counter space conveniently located, and adjoining is the parcel room. On either side of the corridor is a waiting-room for women, and a smoking-room for the men has been provided, each fitted up with complete toilet service. Immigrant quarters

have been arranged under the main building and entrance is made through a suitable corridor from the tracks northwards. This accommodation contains every convenience and is artificially ventilated. The remainder of the huge basement is occupied by the boiler and coal room and the baggage department. The whole of the north wing is occupied by the baggage department with the exception of an allotment made to the Dominion Express for the carrying on of their extensive business. The exterior of the main building and the retaining wall running along Jasper avenue will consist of reinforced concrete with a certain amount of metal facing to relieve the dullness of the concrete. The wall will be specially treated with carborundum blocks. These will be used for rubbing the surface of the concrete smooth, giving the structure the appearance somewhat of a stone building. It will be in reality a monolithic structure, and its appearance depends a great deal on the manner in which the cement surface is finished by the carborundum blocks. The masonry which is to be erected at the main entrance, will be of cast and wrought iron, with a glass roof and supported on columns, which will stand out to the edge of the sidewalk. The interior of the waiting-room will be finished in Keene's cement, which has a beautiful white surface and is very attractive. It will wash and has the appearance of plaster, but is of a very much harder substance, while the base of the room will be of marble and a terrace floor will also be inserted. The wainscoting will be four feet high, and above this the walls will be finished in plaster and paneling with plaster cornices, and when colored or painted will give a very artistic effect. The front of the ticket offices, which are in the waiting room, are also finished in Keene's cement and above the counter notably the iron grilles. There is practically no wood used in the waiting-room except the doors. The designs of the building were executed in the office of the superintendent of building construction at Montreal, and the work is being carried out under the superintendence of the chief engineer's office at Winnipeg.

VICE AT NEW YORK

Investigator Says Individual Police Share in the Grafting.

New York, Jan. 30. — With his evidence reduced to the matter of fact form of a card index, Samuel H. London, formerly prosecuting attorney of El Paso, Texas, who said he was semi-officially connected with the department of justice at Washington, has laid before the aldermanic committee, which is investigating police conditions here, the result of his seven years' study of white slavery traffic. He called New York the capital of commercialized vice, and said that with the assistance of fourteen agents placed at his disposal by the Government, he had carried on investigations "from Fairbanks in Alaska to the canal zone." He declared that his census in New York revealed that there were 6,100 men profiting from commercialized vice in which 26,000 women were involved. He charged that the police often aided the traffickers, but he believed that only individual policemen were concerned in the business, and doubted that the number of these officers would exceed 100 out of 10,000 men on the force.

CONDUCTOR JAILED

Sentenced to a Month for Leaving a Train on the Main Line.

Hamilton, Ont., Jan. 30. — Andrew Methven, of Mimico, the Grand Trunk conductor, who left a freight train, of which he was in charge, standing on the main line in the Stuart street yards after completing his run, instead of waiting to see that it was shunted to a side track, got a month in jail today. Magistrate Jelfs told him that he was a "stupid fellow."

DUROCHER SURRENDERS

Warrant Charges Him With Ballot Stuffing at the Capital.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 30. — Joseph F. Durocher, a civil servant, son of ex-Mayor Durocher, against whom a warrant was issued yesterday on a charge of ballot-box stuffing in the recent mayoralty election, surrendered to the police this morning. He appeared in the police court and was remanded until Wednesday next, without pleading. Six men, known as "repeaters," that he having voted for aldermanic candidates in more than one ward in a municipal election, were summoned to answer charges of voting more than once for mayor. Four appeared and were remanded, and a bench warrant issued for the fifth man.

Provincial Detective Reburn will continue his investigation before the cases are called again, and further developments are hinted at.

Mayor Ellis, in a statement today, says there is evidence of gross corruption in several polls, and that he believes impersonating, "repeating," intimidation and ballot-box stuffing have been carried on for years. In the French wards the vote for English-speaking

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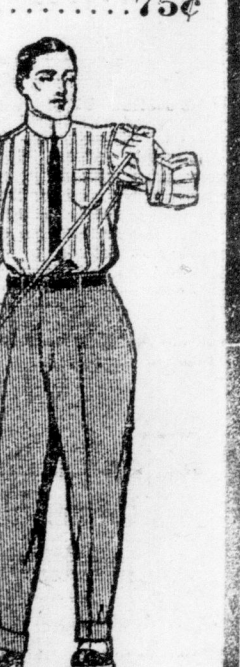
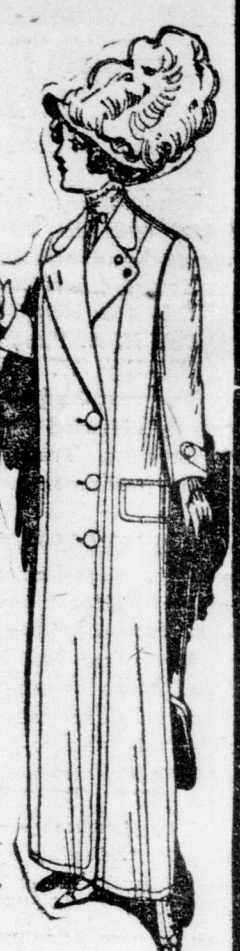
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
