

# BRITISH UNBEATEN, BUT ORDERED BACK

Accounts Show They Behaved With Great Gallantry in Big Battle—Public Enthusiasm Stimulated by the Fight.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Aug. 27.—A cable to the Tribune from London, says: "Regarding the reverses reported in France, where the falling back of the French forces also compelled the British retreat, all accounts show that the British army behaved with the utmost gallantry. They were unbeaten when the general situation necessitated Joffre's order of retreat all along the line."

England has received the news of the loss of 2,000 men with calm reserve, although it is England's greatest loss in one battle since the Crimea. The list of casualties has not been received leaving thousands of relatives and friends distressed and worrying. If anything, England's enthusiasm for war has been stimulated by the British troops' participating, and when the casualties list is published it is likely to have the effect of fully arousing the British lion.

Kitchener's Advertisement. Lord Kitchener's new army of 100,000 has practically been recruited, but thousands of men are still needed and a vigorous campaign to get recruits is being instituted. The latest device is pasting flaming posters on hundreds of taxicabs, saying: "A call to arms. Enlist for the war only." Taxicabs prove splendid advertising media. The Zeppelin's exploit at Antwerp aroused tremendous indignation.

French Admiralty. [Canadian Press.] London, Aug. 27.—A London Standard dispatch from Paris to the Tribune says: "The correspondent of Le Temps, who had occasion to follow them on the way to the front, is loud in his admiration of the British soldiers' discipline, equipment and commissariat arrangements. But what he admired most was the summary methods of dealing with spies, every one convicted being shot immediately. A British captain explained his attitude through a French interpreter, as follows: "Useless Delays. "You French give yourselves up to your humanity in cases where humanity is a mere useless sentimentality. To spare the life of a spy by postponing his trial is a crime against our own troops. A spy may be able by some means to convey a harvest of news to his own side, so as to enable the enemy to surprise us just when we hoped to surprise him. In such cases inopportune indulgence may cost the lives of several hundreds of our own troops."

BATTLE AT LORRAINE BIGGEST IN HISTORY Six Hundred Thousand Men Engaged—German Socialists' Press Patriotic. [Canadian Press.] London, Aug. 27.—4:15 a. m.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Copenhagen says that the German Socialist papers are publishing extremely patriotic articles. The Vorwaerts says it must be every Socialist's duty to fight to the last drop of blood for Germany's existence. Many Socialist leaders have joined the army as volunteers. Among other German volunteers is Baron Von Schoen, until recently ambassador to Paris. He is 63 years old and has been made a colonel.

The Kaiser's third son, Prince-Adalbert, who was betrothed a few weeks ago to Princess Adelaide of Saxemeiningen, was married on Monday.

The Cologne Gazette states that at the battle of Lorraine three hundred thousand men were engaged on each side, the greatest number yet engaged in the history of the world. A German casualty list is published, but it is stated that the place and time of the casualties will not be published until later.

AMERICAN CONSUL STAYS AT KIAO-CHOW Governor of Bloated Territory Notices Him He Can Leave If He Likes. [Canadian Press.] Tsing Tau, Aug. 27.—11:50 a. m.—Vice-Admiral Sadakichi Kato, commandant of the battleship Suwa, sent a wireless message to Governor Meyer Waldeck this morning, declaring a blockade of the leased territory of Kiao-Chow. Later the Japanese warships shelled a small island off the coast, but which was not occupied by the Germans.

The German governor notified Willis R. Peck, American consul at Kiao-Chow, that he had 24 hours to leave or he would be shot. Mr. Peck, however, elected to remain.

STEAMER FRANCISCO ALLOWED TO SAIL Not Known Whether British Freighter Retained Guns. [Canadian Press.] New York, Aug. 27.—Whether the British steamer Francisco was permitted to retain her two 47 rifles mounted aft, or was compelled to disarm before sailing last night with 6,000 tons of grain for Hull, was unknown this forenoon to navy yard officials. The battleship Florida, which stopped the Francisco in the harbor, had not reported to the navy yard.

It was generally believed, however, that the guns were not taken off. The Francisco, according to report, carried no ammunition. Her captain claimed that the rifles were merely a salute battery.

Explanation Wanted. Washington, Aug. 27.—Secretary Daniels today called upon the captain of the New York to ask for a full report of the circumstances under which the battleship Florida halted the British liner Francisco in New York harbor. Officials are at a loss to understand why the Florida held the Francisco up, as she was said to have had proper clearance papers.

U. S. A. TO RAISE HUNDRED MILLIONS Tax On Tobacco, Liquor and Beers Probable Method. [Canadian Press.] Washington, D. C., Aug. 27.—War revenue legislation to add one hundred millions to the Government's annual income was considered today at a conference between Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, Democratic Leader Underwood, of the House, and Chairman Simmons, of the Senate Finance Committee. It is generally understood that the plan for a tax on tobacco, beer and liquors, and possibly a stamp tax, will be carried out.

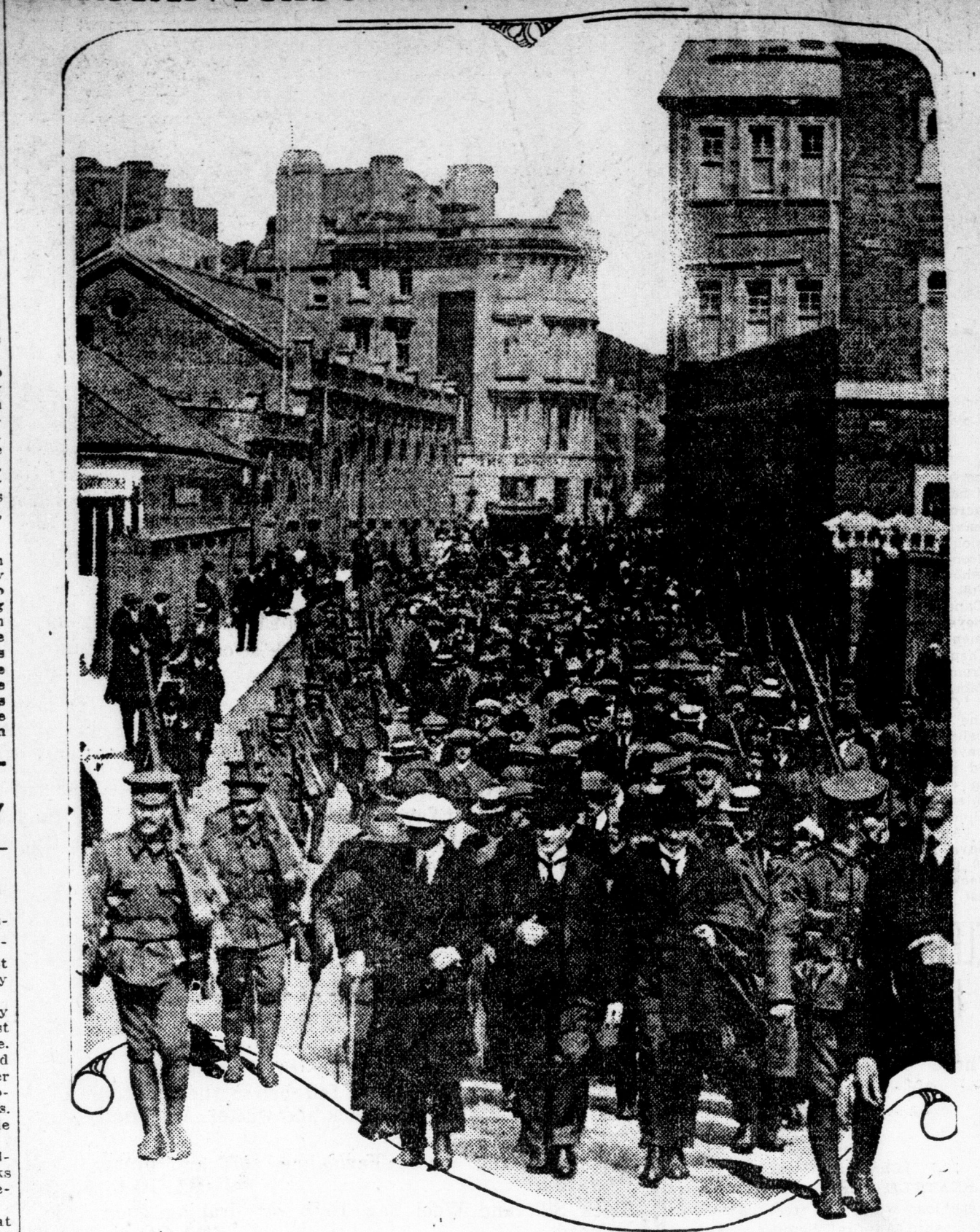

[Canadian Press.] London, Aug. 27.—Mrs. Flora Drummond, Mrs. Dacre Fox, Miss Richardson, and fourteen other militant suffragists were arrested this morning in front of the home office, whether they had gone in an effort to interview Secretary McKenna, the home secretary, on the question of the forcible feeding of women.

When they were refused admission they attempted to force an entrance. A hostile crowd gathered and the women were seriously threatened. At this juncture the police appeared and took them into custody.

## GERMAN PRISONERS OFF TO KINGSTON

Suspects Arrested Here Yesterday Taken There Under Guard.

Fritz Voss and Herman Schmitt, the two Germans taken into custody yesterday when they were about to flee the city for Detroit, were taken to Kingston Penitentiary on the 12:05 Grand Trunk express today, in charge of a guard comprising a color-sergeant and three privates, of the Sixth.

With them were three Austrians, also prisoners apprehended as suspicious characters, two taken at Sarnia, and one at Tilbury.

The two Londoners, Voss and Schmitt were kept at police headquarters over night. This morning they were turned over to the military authorities. The other three men were brought into the city during the night and were escorted to the armories by a two-man detail of the Seventh and lodged in the guard-room.

The eastern flyer running out of London at 6:53 last night carried several Austrians to Kingston. During the last few days it is said that scarcely a through express train arrives in London that does not carry some foreign reservists to the detention quarters at Kingston.

## WILL TAKE CARE OF VOLUNTEERS FAMILIES

Doctors To Meet Tonight To Complete Arrangements For Free Medical Service.

A meeting to which all the physicians of the city are invited, will be held tonight at 8:30 o'clock in the armory, for the purpose of taking some action to aid the families of volunteers left in the city.

Dr. W. R. Roome and Dr. H. A. Kingsmill, who have been instrumental in calling the meeting, have already suggested a plan whereby the city be divided into districts so that each physician can be assigned to one and render free medical treatment to the families of volunteers in that section.

The plan will apply to the families of all volunteers and for this reason a large number of physicians are needed to pledge their support to the scheme and also serve a district to which they may be assigned.

They will be other plans discussed at the meeting tonight and all physicians who attend will be given an opportunity to suggest methods by which free medical aid can be rendered to soldiers' families.
