When the project of electrification was voted on it was stated that \$700,000 would build and equip the road in spite of the fact that experts laughed at such folly, knowing that it could not be done. Since that time the expenditure

has run up to a cool million dollars,

with another \$117,000 asked for. Neither of these sums include about \$35,000 hidden in the expenditure on the hydro sub-station, a clever piece of financing that does justice to the methods of those behind the scheme. Nor do the figures include over \$200,000 that Provincial Auditor Clancy declared in the Legislature had been paid over to the London and Port Stanley Railway out of provincial bydro funds. (Str Adam Beck said this sum was paid back.) The grand total is close to \$1,400 .-000, or double the amount of money voted by the citizens for the electrification of the London and Port Stanley Railway

Much of this money was voted by the people. If the citizens want to vote that much for such a project, that is their business. They have had the right to do so, and they were at least given an opportunity to say whether or not they were willing to expend that sum of

The fact remains, however, that large sums have never been voted on by the people. There was an issue of \$39,000 for extensions, on which the people were not "trusted." There was another issue of \$60,000, on the merits of which the ratepayers had no chance to express an opinion. Now the London and Port Stanley Railway commissioners are asking the city to give them \$117,000 additional for the line. Nearly \$200,000 will thus be expended. The people can be trusted on every other subject but the London and Port Stanley. The faction of Sir Adam Beck, whose methods are being constantly demonstrated, tries to force down the throats of the people the grants of money, without giving them the slightest


