



TORONTO, Jan. 19.—A delegation of fishermen from the western end of Lake Eric waited on Premier Drury Lake Erie waited on Premier Drury today to protest against the continued use of nets with smaller mesh than authorized by government legislation.

It was charged that fishermen at the eastern end of the lake were buying nets of 2%-inch mesh, although according to fishery regulations nothing smaller than 3-inch mesh is to be used at the end of the 1922 season. The delegation asks that permission to use the small mesh be cancelled.


