ONTARIO HOUSE EAGER TO SPEED SESSION'S TASK
Premier Drury Strives To Shorten Debate On Speech From Throne.
CONSERVATIVE CHIEFTAIN HITS DELAY LAST SESSION
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J. McNamara of Riverdale drew the attention of the government to a dispatch from Sudbury that hundreds of unemployed were pouring into Cochrane, believing that work on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway extensions was to begin at once, and these men were being left stranded, as there was still several feet of snow along the right-of-way. He wanted to know if any effort had been made on the part of the government to warn men against rushing to the north country.

Hon. W. R. Rolfe, minister of labor, stated his department had not been informed that there was any rush of unemployed to Cochrane, and had therefore not taken steps to prevent it.

Gets Federal Report.
Premier E. C. Drury explained that he had been informed this week by an official of the federal department of labor that conditions were not in such a serious condition in Cochrane, and there were no great numbers of unemployed coming into that town. Preparatory work along the line where the extensions are to be made had given considerable employment, he said, in reply to Mr. Ferguson's questions as to why the premier in a recent speech had claimed credit for awarding the contract at this time in order to relieve unemployment, if it would be months before it would furnish any work.

The minister of labor was asked whether there was a fair-wage clause in the contract for the extension of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. He said he was not in a position to answer this, the extension coming under another department of the government. This brought back the retort that he should know as minister of labor. The premier said the contract would be tabled, and the members could examine it for themselves.

Ferguson Not Ready.
When the clerk of the house read that the continuation of the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne would be the next order of business, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Conservative leader, stated he had taken it for granted that as Friday was private members' day, the debate would not be continued today, and for this reason he was not prepared to go on. He said it was a time-honored custom not to discuss government business on Friday.

The premier expressed surprise that the Conservative leader was not ready, and wanted to know what day he would be, intimating that it was the wish, he believed, of all sides to complete the debate on the reply as soon as possible and get down to real business.

This led to some cross-fire between the premier and Mr. Ferguson as to who was responsible for the way things dragged last session, the latter putting the blame on the government, claiming it was not ready with government business, and the members of the ministry were not able to explain their measures after they were introduced.

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The premier took the position that the government was not at fault last session and that this session was prepared to hurry government business along. He pointed out that there were no private members' bills sufficiently advanced to be taken up in the house.

The discussion ended when Mr. Ferguson said it had been about decided that his speech would be the only one from the Conservative group on the reply. He had advised his followers that they would have plenty of opportunity when specific bills came up. While some of the Conservative members might wish to join in the debate, their remarks would be brief. He would be prepared to speak on Tuesday, and intimated that the hydro would be one of the questions he would discuss.

Premier Drury will follow Mr. Ferguson.
Hon. Manning Doherty's promised amendment to the rural credit bills of last session were introduced and given first reading today.
The bill permit of an extension of the benefits of the rural credit system, by raising \$1,000 to \$2,000 the maximum short-term loan and by providing for the placing of long-term loans where a part of the amount is to be used in retiring an

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LABOR REPORT TO SHOW ANOMALY
OTTAWA, Feb. 17.—(By Canadian Press).—Reports which will shortly be published by the labor department present an anomalous situation. They show that in the month of January, while employment was still on the increase, there was more time lost through strikes than in either the previous month or in January of 1921.
They show that there were in existence at some time or other during last month 23 strikes, involving about 3,357 work people, with a time loss of about 76,070 working days. During the previous month there were in existence 17 strikes, involving 2,883 work people and 64,733 working days. In January, 1921, there were 21 strikes, involving 1,736 work people, and a time loss of 30,065 working days.

BONOMI CABINET DEFEATED.
ROME, Feb. 17.—Premier Bonomi's cabinet was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies this evening on a vote of confidence. The vote was 235 to 107.
