Acting upon a call from the Toronto Women's Press Club, press women from all parts of Ontario gathered to exchange views on opportunities of today for the woman who writes. Poets, novelists, editors, reporters, publishers, publicity and advertising writers, special feature and syndicate writers were included in the audience.

Friday night's opening meeting followed a dinner. The out-of-town guests were received by the president of the Toronto Club, Miss Charlotte Storey, assisted by the executive.

The following addressed the conference on the work of the weekly and semi-weekly newspapers: Miss Hazel Stratton, Orillia; Mrs. W. N. Wilkinson, Oakville; Mrs. D. A. Miss Storey was appointed chairman of the conference, and Mrs. D. A. Campbell of Durham, secretary.

Speakers on "How to Market Manuscripts" were Mrs. Ringland and Miss Violet Dickens. "Interviewing and Reporting" was the subject of the address given by Mrs. Muir.

Saturday morning's session included a discussion of women's pages by Mrs. A. A. Perry, Mrs. Harold Purser and Mrs. L. A. Gurnett. An interesting address on "Newspaper Ethics" was given by Miss Isabel Armstrong of The London Advertiser.

Mr. J. F. B. Livesey was the luncheon speaker, his subject being "Newspaper Mechanics."

The afternoon session included addresses on the "Dominion Club," by Miss Lucy Doyle of the Toronto Telegram, national president of the Canadian Women's Press Club, and "Advertising," by Miss Eleanor Stephens.

At the close of the session Mrs. Cockshutt held a reception at Government House for the conference. Other out-of-town guests were: Mrs. William Dawson, Parkhill; Mrs. R. M. Graham, Miss Isabel Armstrong, Miss Helen McMillan and Miss R. Kennedy, all of London.

A CHARMING MODEL FOR EARLY AUTUMN.

This style combines the low waist-line with the popular use of two materials very cleverly. The tuck-like trimming bands on the skirt are bias strips of the same material as the waist and sleeves. The skirt is stitched to the waist at the hip-line, and the fullness is concentrated on the sides, giving a flat front and back effect. Satin could be employed effectively for the upper part of this dress, with a woolen material like serge for the lower part, and then, counting on satin at \$1.75 per yard and serge at \$1 per yard, your dress would cost \$6.25. Any woman who sews at all could cut and finish a dress made from this pattern in about a day and a half.

The pattern, No. 1874, cuts in sizes 36, 38, 40 and 42 inches bust measure. Size 36 requires 2 1/2 yards 36-inch material, with 1 1/2 yards 36-inch contrasting. Price 15 cents, stamps or coin (coin preferred).

## TO EXTERMINATE ROACHES.

Dear Miss Grey,—I saw in your paper where some one gave a remedy for cockroaches, but I have mislaid the paper, so would you kindly tell me through your paper what the name of it was? All I can remember is that it was a powder of some sort. You will find inclosed a mite for the S. C. H. Hoping to hear from you soon, AUTUMN.

What is required—10 cents worth of carbon disulphide, 20 cents worth of lysol and one quart of coal oil.

Method—Mix carbon disulphide well with coal oil and then add the lysol. Put this into a bottle and keep well corked. When required for use take part of the mixture and add ten parts of water. (Put the water in a vessel first, as it is important to add the mixture to water). Paint with small brush, walls and crevices where roaches are. I do not know the method you referred to, but if any Boxites have it, will they please send it in for Autumn?
