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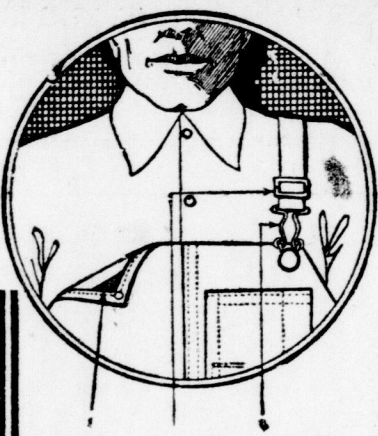
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London Professor Given Two Degrees By Oxford

Rev. Frank Anderson of Huron College Receives B.D. and D.D.

OXFORD GRADUATE

Oxford has conferred the degrees of B.D. and D.D. upon Rev. Professor Frank Anderson, M.A., B.D., professor of church history at Huron College. Word to this effect was received in the city by cable yesterday, the degrees having been conferred at a congregation held last Thursday.

Dr. Anderson, who is a graduate of Oxford, received word last September that the theses which he had presented to the regius professor of divinity on "The Greek Apologists of the First Two Centuries" had been accepted as amply sufficient to qualify him for receiving these degrees in course.

For the purpose of taking them in person at Oxford, Dr. Anderson had expected to sail next Friday for England. About a month ago, however, he learnt that unless he could reach Oxford before the end of the term on July 5, there were difficulties in the way of doing this, but that an application to have them conferred "in absentia" would be in order.

LABOR IS AGAIN BEATEN IN HOUSE

Conservative-Liberal Combination Defeats Macdonald Regime on Motion.

London, June 24.—The Labor government sustained another defeat in the House of Commons last night by the substantial vote of 315 against 175, in consequence of a Conservative-Liberal combination in favor of referring a motion dealing with the financial provisions of the housing bill to a committee of the whole House instead of to a special committee which the government sought to impose. The defeat, however, was one of procedure and not of principle. No political significance therefore was attached to it and the other business of the House proceeded.

Prior to this incident the bill which embodies the financial resolutions had already passed its second reading after a motion presented by the opposition for its rejection had met with defeat by a vote of 269 to 206. The opposition argued that the bill was unsound in theory and practice and that its financing was thoroughly bad. The Liberals also expressed their discontent, and it was a motion of C. F. Masterman (Liberal, Rushmore) which resulted in the government's discomfiture.

STUDENTS TO CONTROL SCHOOL TENNIS COURTS

Playing Plans Are Being Drawn Up at Central Collegiate.

The students' council at the Central Collegiate Institute is arranging for the use of the tennis courts at that school during the vacation period. The student body will govern the use of the courts from 9 o'clock in the morning until 6 in the evening. The splendid courts have just been furnished with new backstops and are in good shape for play.

Outdoors have applied for the use of the courts, applicants including the young people's division at Central Methodist Church. However, it is expected that the students of the college will use them for the greater part of the time, and if the courts are not in use during the evenings special arrangements may be made. Plans for use of the court after tea cannot be completed until the students make their arrangements.

FORMER LONDONER, E. C. BOWKER, DIES

Manager of Dominion Bank in City For Two Years.

E. Clarke Bowker, former branch manager of the Dominion Bank in London, died in Toronto on Saturday at the General Hospital. Mr. Bowker had endured an illness of six weeks, from which no hope was held out for his recovery.

Shortly before his illness, Mr. Bowker received word of his appointment as the New York agent for the Dominion Bank, and with his wife and family had taken up residence there. He left London two years ago, on his appointment as assistant manager of the Toronto branch of the Dominion Bank, establishing his home in Toronto.

Entering on leaving school, Mr. Bowker had been in the service of the Dominion Bank for 33 years. He had served as branch manager in London, in Brandon, Man., and in Edmonton, Alta.

Mr. Bowker was formerly a member of the London Rotary Club and flowers were sent from the London delegation attending the Toronto convention recently. It was announced at the Rotary Club meeting yesterday that no hopes were held for his recovery.

The widow, Mrs. Kathleen Bowker, was formerly a member of the London Women's Press Club. Mrs. Bowker contributes frequently to magazines and is the literary editor of the Canadian Bookman, and while in London contributed many articles to The Advertiser.

In Canada's Parliament

Ottawa, June 24.—Today in parliament:

Yesterday in parliament:
In the Senate, Senator Robertson opposed the excise tax on cigarettes, on the ground that it encouraged wholesale smuggling, which resulted in a loss of revenue, loss to industry and an increase in unemployment.

In the House of Commons, Hon. Charles Stewart, acting postmaster-general, said that the government could not consider arbitration with its employees. A bill amending the juvenile delinquents act was given third reading.

There was a long discussion on the vote for the Wembley Exhibition, E. J. Garland (Progressive, Bow River) moving to reduce the vote by \$20,000 as a protest against a proposal to send a party of parliamentarians to the exhibition. The amendment was defeated by 86 to 48, Liberals voting against it, and Progressives dividing.
