The reason lies in the fact that the chain groceries maintain their own warhouses and practically eliminate the middle man, thus garnering the bulk of both middle-

Outlines Stand of Catholics

Attitudes of various religious denominations on the evolution controversy have been more or less freely expressed as the Day-ton trial drew near. Speaking from a Roman Catholic viewpoint, Rev. John R. Ryan, D.D., of the Catholic University of America, wrote recently:
"The attitude that a Catholic

might reasonably take toward the Tennessee statute and its fate in the courts would seem to be about as follows: To hope that the law would be declared unconstitutional, since it might easily become a precedent for grace and tyrannical interferences by legislative majorities with the curri culum of the public schools and, indeed, of private schools, and to remain undisturbed concerning the relation of the Bible to science; for Catholics know that here can be no real conflict this respect, and they realize that the meaning of any passage of the Bible is determined for them. not by a state legislature, or ourt of justice, or a legal advo-ate, but by the infallible voice of the church."

On June 30, the net debt stood at \$2,378,000,000. On June 30, a year ago, the net debt was \$2,389,000,000. During the month of June last year there was an increase in net debt of \$4,648,729. During June, this year, there was a decrease in net debt of \$175,000.
