Toronto, Hamilton and Montreal were the first Canadian cities to organize local councils in November, 1893. Ottawa, Londoa, Winnipeg, Quebec, Kingston, St. John, Halifax and Dartmouth, West Algoma. Victoria and Vancouver Island, and Vancouver followed their example in 1894. Regina, Vernon, Calgary, Brandon and Rat Portage organized councils in 1895; Charlottetown, P. E. I., and New Westminster in 1898; and East Pictou County in 1899. The national societies in affiliation with the National Council are the Women's Art Association, the Girls' Friendly Society, the Dominion Women's Enfranchisement Association, the Dominion Order of the King's Daughters, the Aberdeen Association, and the Victorian Order of Nurses.
