NO IMPROVEMENT IN LUMBER TRADE

British Business of Limited Character Only is Now Offering.

Liverpool, Aug. 1, 1921.—The trading of the past month showed little or no improvement and the volume of business passing was of limited character. Under these conditions it is pleasing to note that imports, with few exceptions, were confined to actual needs. Stocks, in many cases, are full and should not be added to until there are unmistakable signs of recovering trade. Prices are uncertain and the result of the Public Auction Sales of Softwoods held in Liverpool during July must be disappointing. Ocean tonnage appears fairly plentiful with rates rather easier. The Bank rate was further reduced to 5-1/2 per cent.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Spruce and Pine Deals, &c.—The import amounted to 1,820 standards, which includes a cargo to Garston of about 950 standards, from St. John, still unsold. About 2,620 standards went into consumption, compared with 3,900 standards for the corresponding period of last year. Stocks are still on the heavy side, viz: 20,600 standards, although they show a considerable reduction from the same month of last year, viz: 28,800 standards. Business for forward shipment was of an unimportant character, with prices showing further decline. A fair quantity was disposed of at the Auction Sales "without reserve" held in Liverpool during the month, at disappointing prices. Tonnage offering fairly freely at easier rates. Pine Deals—Demand extremely quiet, but stocks are moderately light.

Birch—Logs—Liverpool received an import of about 1,000 cubic feet, which went into consumption. No arrivals in Manchester. The demand is disappointing and stocks showed no change during the month. Planks, &c.—The bulk of the import of 30,000 cubic feet was to Liverpool, coming forward in a cargo from St. John. The consumption demand was extremely quiet, consequently stocks are increased to 242,000 cubic feet.

NEVER SAW AUTO BEFORE

Man Who Has Lived 27 Years in Canada's North Land Comes Out.

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 15.—Many strange sights awaited James Baillie when he came out of the wilds the other day, for James had, for twenty-seven years been a resident of the far north around Fort Providence and the occasion of his visit to civilization was the first leave in more than a decade. Baillie didn't know what an automobile looked like and when he summoned sufficient courage to climb into a taxi cab when his train pulled in, the meter clicked up a small fortune before the visitor tired of his experience. Baillie went into the Fort Providence district as an employee of the Hudson's Bay Company twenty-seven years ago. It took him more than four months to go in, but transportation facilities enabled him to reach Calgary in seven days coming out. He brought his fourteen-year-old son with him as he wanted him to finish his education. The boy having passed through all grades of the mission school at Fort Providence. Baillie intends going back to his post as quickly as possible, though he promises to return and settle down before another twenty-seven years rolls by.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE SALMON.

"Salmon are sea fish and when mature feed only in the sea.

Salmon enter fresh water at various times of the year, but only spawn in November.

A salmon only spawns two or three times in its eight or nine year's life.

Salmon eggs are large as fish eggs go—nine hundred for each one pound of weight of fish.

Large salmon have larger eggs than small salmon, and are the best breeding stock.

Spawns must be deposited in cool, running fresh water, among gravel.

Before hatching, spawn lies in the gravel from three to five months (e. i., till April).

"Avelins" taken seven weeks to become "fry"—one inch long—l. e., in May.

"Fry" become Parr and are 2-1/2 inches long when one year old.

"Parr" means five inches long and two year's old become "smolts".

GANG MURDERS

AROUND DETROIT

New York, Aug. 20.—Information that may solve seven gang murders committed in Detroit since 1916 was obtained yesterday from Bartolo Fontano, under arrest in connection with the activities of the "Good Killers," according to Detective McPherson, of Detroit, who gave the prisoner a severe grilling.

"Fontano told me," McPherson said, "that he knew how the Detroit jobs were done. Most of these murders were of the automobile variety, done by gangsters in cars, who got away. We arrested one man, but he was tried and acquitted."

The detective said Fontano declared he knew the members of the murder band, but denied he had taken part in the crimes. The prisoner admitted, McPherson said, that he had set a couple of fire in Detroit within the last two or three years, and that he had been in that city about 18 months ago.
