Western "U" Graduates For British Diplomatic Service

Will Be Granted Special Facilities
For Entrance Into That
Work.

Special facilities will in future be pro-
vided whereby graduates of Western
University may enter the Imperial diplo-
matic service on an equal footing
with graduates from English colleges.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of
the Board of Governors of the Univer-
sity a communication was received from
the Dominion government under-secretary
of state for external affairs in which
it was stated that the Rt. Hon. Winston
Churchill, secretary of state for the
colonies in the United Kingdom cabinet,
desired the closest co-operation with
Canadian universities in placing
selected men from their annual class
of graduates in the diplomatic service
of the empire.

The Board of Governors, on motion,

decided to take advantage of the oppor-
tunity thus afforded and instructed the
executive secretary to communicate that
action to the Dominion secretary con-
cerned.

Further details will be worked out
within a short while, it is understood,
and the actual nomination of graduates
for the Imperial diplomatic service will
be left in the hands of the executive
committee of the university on advice
of Dean Fox and Lt.-Col. Walter J. Brown.

Members of the board expressed the
opinion that this opportunity afforded
by the British government marks an-
other step in the progress of Imperial
unity, and that the university's pre-
stige will be greatly increased both from
the fact that its graduates are consid-
ered eligible on graduation for what is
termed the most difficult diplomatic ser-
vice in the world, as well as in the
opening up of another avenue of splen-
did opportunity for Western Ontario
young men.

SAV GOOD BEE TWO OFFICERS

Salvation Army Regret Departure
of Commissioner Richards.

GOING TO AUSTRALIA

High Tributes Paid at Gathering
At Masonic Temple.

It was a touching farewell which the
Salvationists of London, St. Thomas
and Chatham and the citizens of Lon-
don tendered to Commissioner Richards
and Mrs. Richards at the Masonic
Temple last night. Commissioner
Richards has been in charge of the
work of the Salvation Army in Canada
East for seven years and leaves soon
to take charge of the work of the
Army in Australia. The hall was
crowded on this occasion of the
last appearance in London of this
beloved officer of the Army and his
wife, who has done so much to ad-
vance the work in the district since
they came to Canada.

James Gray was chairman of the
meeting and many of the officers of
the local corps, who have worked with
Commissioner Richards, spoke briefly
at the meeting last night. The com-
missioner and Mrs. Richards both ad-
dressed the gathering and expressed
their appreciation of the touching fare-
well and the splendid work which the
officers of the Army had done during
the past seven years.

THANKS HELPERS.
Commissioner Richards in his ad-
dress gave the credit for the success
which had attended his efforts while
stationed in the Eastern Canadian
division to those who had so faithfully
helped and co-operated with him. He
declared, moreover, that without the
assistance of the young people, with
whom he has been especially con-
cerned, he could have done nothing.
He declared that they were a splendid
force. It was not what he had done,
but what all the comrades had done.

Touching some of the work which
had been accomplished in the division
during the seven years that he had been
in charge Commissioner Richards gave
some figures of the actual growth of
the army. He stated that 30 citadels
had been added to the division; three
summer camps for boys and girls had
been established; 17 institutions had
been established for military purposes
since the beginning of the war; 39
houses for the use of field and staff
officers had been purchased and 17 sites
for citadels had been bought. In all a
total of \$1,499,836 had been spent in this
way.

Mrs. Richards gave all the credit for
the work which had been accomplished
to her husband and the workers in the
corps. She declared that they all ap-
peared to have come as one man.
They had become bound together. Dur-
ing the time that they had been in
Canada they had given themselves abso-
lutely to the people of Canada. She
and her husband had given more than
40 years to the grand and glorious
work. They had traveled together side
by side and shared each other's
troubles and joys.

In closing she thanked the gathering
for their presence and their esteem and
their good wishes and offered a fervent
prayer that God might prosper and
bless all of those whom she had come
to love so much.

LAUDS ARMY

Mr. Gray, the chairman, expressed
his regard for the Salvation Army in
a few brief remarks. He stated that
whenever he attended one of the meet-
ings he became infused with the en-
thusiasm which was always manifest.
He declared that the business people of
London had a deep regard for the Army
because they were people that really
did things and this outside of the
wonderful spiritual work which they
carried on.

Col. Rawlings told the gathering that
it had been his privilege to accompany
Commissioner Richards and Mrs. Rich-
ards on their farewell tour, and every-
where the citizens as well as mem-
bers of the Army had turned out in
great numbers to bid the officer and his
wife farewell. He declared, however,
that there was not a finer field of the
Salvation Army in London. He
declared that he knew how faithful
the commissioner had been in his divi-
sion. He had been the prophet of the
people and this was evidence of the
blessing of God on his efforts. He
pointed out in this regard that the ma-
jority of the cadets in the training
colleges had been influenced to become
officers in the Army through the young
people's rallies held by the commis-
sioner.

Adjutant Wilcox, Sergt.-Major An-
drews, Commandant Adams and Young
People's Sergt.-Major Cook, of St.
Thomas, spoke briefly, expressing their
appreciation of the work of the com-
missioner and Mrs. Richards during
their seven years in Canada.
There were a number of musical num-
bers during the evening from not only
the London band, but from the Chat-
ham band and from a group of Chat-
ham songsters. There were a large
number present from both St. Thomas
and Chatham at the farewell meeting.

REJOINS POLICE FORCE

William Snell, Former Policeman, and
Veteran of the Late War, Back
Birell's organization. For seven years
to the war, and was an efficient officer

resigned from the force and joined the
old 6th Field Battery, which was known
later as the 12th Field Battery. He won
the D. C. M. for bravery on the field,
and is the holder of three service medals.

sergeant-major. F. C. Snell went over-
seas with three others of the local force,
Sergt. Barnhill, Sergt. "Jim" Oakley,
and the late Alex. Ewan, who died
about a year ago.

NAME DELEGATES FOR CONVENTION

Many Ladies to Help Pick Gov-
ernment Candidate Here.

WARD MEETINGS ARE HELD

City's 78 Subdivisions Allotted
Six Delegates Each.

Ward meetings of Government sup-
porters were held last evening at the
Masonic Temple, Chesley Avenue
School and Foresters' Hall, East Lon-
don, and brought out gatherings fully
representative of the 78 city subdivi-
sions.

At Masonic Temple, where electors
of Wards 1 and 2, with parts of 3 and
4, had been called, E. R. Dennis de-
livered a brief but vigorous address,
referring to the issues of the campaign
and the importance of everyone exer-
cising the franchise, and called upon J.
Percy Moore to review the situation
with reference to registration.

Municipal lists of 1921 will be used,
according to agreement. Mr. Moore ex-
plained, however, that Wards 1 and 3 are
concerned, and registration will be held
all next week in 14 places to afford op-
portunity for addition of names of those
eligible to vote. The qualifications are
very simple: To be a British subject,
21 years of age, a resident of the Do-
minion for one year and of the elec-
toral district two months prior to Octo-
ber 11, 1921. Should names of eligible
persons be omitted when registration
is held, application may be made to
the revising officer, who will hold a
sitting some two weeks later.

The list for this election is so large
that the revising officer, who will hold a
sitting some two weeks later, will have
to deal with a large number of names.
Representatives of the different sub-
divisions last night prepared lists of
delegates to the nominating conven-
tion to be held on Monday, each sub-
division being allotted six. A consid-
erable number of the 468 who will pick a
candidate at the Masonic Temple next
week will be women. Number of names
will be placed before the convention.
